Jamestown, N. D., Oct. 19.—The funeral of Engineer John Wantland was held from Flint's undertaking parlors here yesterday. There was a short prayer and service by Rev. Brayfield of the Episcopal church. The dead engineer was a member of the Elks a Shriner and member of the F. O. E. Beautiful floral offerings were sent from various lodges, also from the railroad orders to which he belonged. He has a brother living in Los Angeles, one at San Francisco and one in Baltimore, Md. The remains were sent east on No. 4 Monday, and will be taken to Baltimore for burial. This is the home of the Wantland family. A member of the engineers' order, John 'Rouzie', will accompany the remains to their final resting place.

Rev. Brayfield spoke in high terms of the character of the deceased, for honesty and upright habits of life. A number of the floral emblems were at the coffin and the room was crowded with friends and intimate acquaintances of the dead. An escort from each lodge accompanied the casket from the undertaking parlors to the station.

While his plans were not divulged to his immediate friends, it is reported that he expected to move to California and reside; also that he was expecting to be married in the near future to a lady at present a resident of California.
