WALTER MILLER COMING NOV. 3

Welterweight Champion of World Will Meet Novak in Handicap Match

TO THROW LOCAL MAN TWICE IN 90 MINUTES

Bout At Armory Wednesday, Nov. 3 First Appearance of Miller Here

The best wrestling bout ever staged in the city will be put on at the armory Wednesday evening, November 3, when Walter Miller of St. Paul, welterweight champion of the world, will meet Joe Novak of this city, claimant of the welterweight championship of the northwest, in a handicap match. Miller agrees to throw the local man twice in 90 minutes or forfeit the match. Miller, in his whole career as a wrestler, has never lost a fall to a welterweight. He won the world's title from Fred Barile of Rochester, N. Y., after one of the most grueling matches in the history of the game.

To Meet Pat Brown. At present Miller is training Billings for a match with Pat Brown of Houston, Texas, for the middleweight championship. The doctory champion is a little wryly over the claims of Novak, and agreed to come to this city to make good his claim. Novak accepted his challenge and since that time has been training daily.

Novak has been in the wrestling game for a number of years, but has never had the opportunity to meet any of the big men. The present match will give him his long awaited opportunity, and he is determined to back up his claims.

A number of local wrestling enthusiasts have watched Novak training during the past few days, and have been greatly impressed with his work. Novak a Comer.

DISCHARGED MEN IN TOILS AGAIN

Carl Hanson, Discharged Convict, Faces Another Term in Penitentiary

A few years in the state penitentiary may make a man loath to leave that institution, at any rate Carl Hanson seems to have a penchant for returning to the state penitentiary. Hanson was discharged Oct. 14, and in less than a week got into a mix-up which bids fair to land him back in his old cell for another period of years. Early this week he went to the home of Julian Nelson on Sixth street, accompanied by Charles Lund, also a discharged inmate of the state pen. Matt Hill, who also served a term and was discharged at the same time Hanson was, was staying at the Nelson home. Hanson knew Hill had money and attacked him, beating him up and taking what money he had. Luckily Hill had left the greater part of his money, which amounted to something over \$100, with the state parole officer for safe keeping.

Police Captain Martineson appeared on the scene shortly after the crime was committed and soon had Hanson lodged in the county jail. He was given a hearing this week, and found over to the next term of the district court. Hanson threatened to kill Nelson, if he breathes a word of the crime, but the old man managed to notify Officer Martineson and Hanson was arrested less than one-half hour after he beat and robbed Hill. Lund managed to evade the officers but was arrested Thursday night by Martineson and Deputy Welch. He is being held in the county jail pending a hearing. Hanson's bonds were fixed at \$1,000 and Lund's at \$500. Hanson has already served two terms at the state penitentiary. He was out on parole after serving a short sentence for robbery. He held up a former comrade while on parole and was sent back to serve the balance of his sentence. When discharged he was re-arrested and sent up a second time for that hold-up. If convicted on the present charge it will make three terms for the man.

Great credit is due Officer Chris Martineson for the speedy manner in which he landed the man, and also for the capture of Lund, who will be held as an accomplice.

PERMANENT BODY FOR NATIONAL DEFENSE IS NOW PROPOSED

Boston, Mass., Oct. 22.—The establishment of a permanent council for national defenses was urged as a primary measure of preparedness by speakers at a mass meeting held under the auspices of the National Security league tonight. Governor Walsh and United States Senator John W. Weeks, both of whom advocated the defense council idea, said its success could not be assured unless it were removed from political influence. It was the opinion of Governor Walsh that those citizens who were frightened by the word, "militarism" were needlessly alarmed, because he said, there could be no such word "in a country where the citizens are soldiers and the soldiers are citizens." "So long as the Monroe Doctrine is an active, virile factor in our national policy," he continued, "we cannot longer deceive ourselves that a military policy is unnecessary." Senator Weeks emphasized the need of proper development of a great army reserve.

LANDSEEKERS ARE STILL POURING IN

About 250 registrations were recorded here yesterday for the Berthold lands to be thrown open by the government for homestead entry. All incoming trains are bringing in land-seekers from all parts of the country, and it is generally expected that the registrations for the Berthold lands

will exceed 10,000 before the end of the month. The registration booths in this city, at Plaza and Minot will be open until the end of the month the last day allowed for registration. Word is expected from the Northern Pacific officials to the effect that trains Nos. 7 and 3 will be held here for ten minutes to allow passengers desiring to do so to register. The registration booths will not be open Sunday, but a big rush is looked for today.

He was fined \$25 and costs for peddling without a license and was then bound over to the district court under \$500 bail for carrying concealed weapons.
