MILLER EXPECTED TO ARRIVE TODAY

Welterweight Champion Will Finish Training at Co. A Armory Next Week

Walter Miller of St. Paul, welterweight champion wrestler of the world, will arrive here today on No. 4, and will finish training here early next week for his match with Joe Novak of this city Wednesday night, Nov. 3.

Miller will work out the early part of the week at Co. A armory, but has already done practically all the training he will do previous to the match. Novak also has been training hard for the match, and is in the best of condition. For the past month he has been training daily, doing both road and mat work to get in condition. Novak will weigh about 155 pounds for the match, while Miller is expected to weigh in a little over that figure, but under 160 pounds.

Novak is counting on getting a fall out of the champion, but will have to stay at least 90 minutes to win the match. Miller's agreement was that he would throw Novak twice in 90 minutes or forfeit the match. Novak is more than anxious to get a fall on the champion, as it will mean a great deal for his future in the game, which he plans on following.

Following the match here Miller will leave for Houston, Texas, where he is scheduled to meet "Pal" Brown for the middleweight championship of the United States. From Texas he will go west to the Pacific coast states, where he has a number of matches scheduled.

Miller is in the pink of condition at the present time, and is ready for a hard season to end his present title, and attempt to win new laurels.

These children will draw lots among themselves for the order in which they will draw envelopes from the pile. The two holding Nos. 3 and 4 will follow in numerical order and the persons whose names are drawn by them will have third and fourth choice. The same order of drawing will be observed during all the low numbers.

The officials have decided to draw 2,650 names. These they believe will be sufficient to take up all the homesteads available.

The envelopes containing the names of those who have registered at Minot, Bismarck and Plaza will be emptied into a pile on the floor. They will be thoroughly mixed by the use of a pitchfork or other utensil, so that the contents of the several containers will be completely lost in the whole. The child assigned to draw the first number will then wade into the pile and pick up an envelope which will give the party whose name it contains the right to make first choice.

LAST DAY FOR REGISTRATION

Total Registration for Berthold Lands Will Be Well Over 30,000

Today is the last day on which land seekers can register for the Fort Berthold lands which will be thrown open for homestead entry by the government next day. The registration for the lands so far has been very heavy, and it is generally expected that there will be a big rush today, before the booths are closed.

There are about 2,000 tracts of land in the Berthold reservation which can be filed on, and last night the total registration from the three points, Plaza, Minot and Bismarck, was well over 25,000. The total in the lead with approximately 18,750. Bismarck had slightly over 7,000 and Plaza 2,830.

The big rush at all points was last week, when the low fares put into effect by the Northern Pacific and Soo Line railroads brought thousands into the state, who would not otherwise have made the trip. Many made the trip only to find that they were disqualified and could not register.

Today's registrations will in all likelihood swell the total to over 30,000. The drawing will commence at Minot next Thursday and will continue until each registered name is arranged consecutively, in the order of drawing. The registration booths will close at 12 o'clock tonight.

Persons who are fortunate enough to draw numbers at Minot next week will be notified by the federal government, but will not be allowed to enter the tracts until May 1. Persons holding numbers are required to be present on the opening day of entry.

Children Will Draw.

The children who will draw the numbers in the allotment of the Fort Berthold land when the drawings take place on November 4, have been selected and are already looking forward to their participation in the affair as the biggest event in their lives. Two boys and two girls have been selected by Judge McPhaul. The names of the participants are as follows:
