### MILLER FAILS TO THROW JOE NOVAK

Welterweight Champion of the World Loses Handicap Match to Local Grappler

WRESTLE 90 MINUTES WITHOUT A FALL

Novak Takes Severe Punishment at Hands of Champion But Stays With Him

Walter Miller of St. Paul, welterweight champion of the world, lost to Joe Novak of Bismarck, welterweight champion of the Northwest, in a handicap match at the Bismarck armory last night. The agreement was that Miller should throw Novak twice in a period of 90 minutes or forfeit the match. Miller failed to get a fall on Novak, but gave the local man the most severe punishment he has ever had on the mat. Novak's superior strength was what saved him.

About 300 wrestling fans witnessed the bout last night, and left the armory satisfied that it was the best wrestling match seen in the capital city in a long time.

Miller weighed in at about 150 pounds, previous to the match, while Novak tipped the beam at about 155. Miller, however, made up for the slight difference in weight by his superior generalship and science. Novak's great strength, which enabled him to break almost any hold the champion secured on him, and his wonderful staying powers were what won the match for him.

In Tight Places. Time and again Miller had Novak where it seemed almost certain he would pin his shoulders to the mat, but the local man managed to wiggle out of his clutches. Early in the match the men rolled off the raised platform, and Miller wrenched his left arm. This had little to do with his losing the match, however.

Commissioner C. N. Kirk refereed the match last night, and proved a most capable and efficient official. The grapplers kept him on the move every minute of the time, but no rough tactics whatever were employed by either man.

Arrange Second Match. At the conclusion of the match last night Novak announced that he would meet Miller in a finish match at the earliest possible date, if terms could be arranged. Miller agreed to meet Novak in a finish match and to place a \$250 side bet, winner to be declared by best two falls out of three.

The match was arranged last night, and November 17 agreed on as the tentative date.

Miller will leave today for Billings, Mont., where he will take part in a match November 12.

Local wrestling fans have been loath to give Novak credit for being a first-class wrestler, but after the manner in which he held Miller last night, a number of them have changed their opinion, and have a much higher regard for his ability. Novak showed conclusively last night that he is able to meet the best wrestlers in his class in the country, and is deserving of patronage from the local fans.

Miller stated after the match that Novak was one of the toughest and gamiest men he had ever run into, and that he was a comer in the wrestling game. With a little more coaching he will be able to stack up with the best men in the country.

In the bout last night Miller worked like a Trojan from the very start to get a fall on the local man, and had him in precarious positions a hundred times. Novak was able to withstand the pressure, however, and it was an absolute impossibility for the champion to throw him.

Miller requested that City Commissioner Kirk be engaged to referee the coming bout, and it is likely that he will officiate again. Both men have absolute confidence in Mr. Kirk.
