EXTEND WELCOME TO NEW PASTOR

Members of McCabe Memorial Church Extend Welcome to Rev. Hutcheson

A most cordial welcome was extended by the congregation of the Methodist Episcopal church to their new pastor, Dr. W. J. Hutcheson, Mrs. Hutcheson and other members of the family and Mrs. J. G. Moore, wife of Dr. J. G. Moore, the new superintendent, last evening in the church. Dr. Moore was unable to attend on account of attending a meeting in California, of which he is a member of the committee.

J. K. Doran, one of the oldest members of the official board, in point of service, presided. Mr. Doran in behalf of the congregation, welcomed the honor guests, Dr. J. M. Taylor gave the invocation. This was followed by the singing of the hymn, "A Charge to Keep."

After an interesting musical program, which included numbers by Miss Gertrude Hoffman, pianist; W. D. Miller, tenor; Miss Lyle Yegen, violinist; and Mrs. John A. Larson, soprano, Dr. Hutcheson warmly responded to the felicitations tendered Mrs. Hutcheson, himself and family. His remarks were both timely and entertaining. Dr. Hutcheson came to the Bismarck church from Fargo, where he closed a most successful pastorate. In behalf of her husband, Mrs. Moore responded to the welcome extended herself and husband in a most gracious manner. She asked the support of the women of the congregation in her new work in this new field and gave a brief outline of the work she intends to carry on among the young people.

Following the program the guests were entertained in the church parlors, where refreshments were served by the ladies of the church. Following is the address given by Mr. Doran:

As a representative of this official board and the members of this church I arise to extend our welcome to our incoming pastor, Dr. W. J. Hutcheson, and on behalf of this board I pledge him our loyal support for the coming year, or until such time, as according to the itinerary system of our church he may be transferred to another field. It might be well to slightly review some of our past history and try to profit thereby.

My experience with this church began after the foundations of this building were laid. The first service attended by myself and family was the corner stone laying. From that day to this we have as faithfully served under the noble men that have been in charge here as we can serve under you. Personally we loved those men and worked to our best ability in full accord with them in everything tending to the upbuilding of the Master's work in this vineyard. But in the Divine order of Providence they are not with us now and to you, our dear brother, we extend our sympathies and love and pledge to you our sincere and faithful efforts to continue the work so nobly begun by your predecessors.

In the past few weeks I have seldom, if ever, been so impressed with the direct bearing of the scriptural teachings in our Sunday school lessons upon our direct church problem.

When Joseph was crowned king conditions of the temple were bad and the worship of the true God had fallen into disrepute and idolatry had taken its place. The good king and the great high priest tried to repair the breaches in the temple and to restore the true worship. There are no serious breaches in our church building here, but there is much unfinished work. This we hope will be finished under your pastorate. Then we have some obligations that we must meet before this other is commenced.

The Jewish people had plenty of money to use in making the repairs and when it was brought into the temple in the forms of tithes, pledges and otherwise the offerings were sufficient. Now, we are able here to meet every obligation promptly when our congregation brings in the tithes and offerings.

I have no criticisms to make here, or elsewhere, as I am opposed to much criticism, but if I did have any to make, I should say that I believed that we should make it upon ourselves as an official body in not being more aggressive in our work and confidential with our members of this big family. Many times with hearts sore and in dire financial distress, we have kept our own council and allowed ourselves to be censured for not meeting our bills and often putting our hands in our own pockets and using the money our families were needing, to pay church obligations, and hoping that by the next time the collections would be better. 
