everyone has been planned, and the club dining room and kitchen will be used for the occasion. Service will continue throughout the evening, or until everyone has had their fill of the good things. It is planned to begin the program at 8 o'clock, and business men who cannot come until later will find themselves in time for some of the evening's best entertainment features, not least among which will be the aforesaid luncheon. It is probably that an Old Settlers' association for the purpose of making such gatherings of at least annual occurrence will be the outcome of next Saturday's reunion. The plan has met with favor everywhere, and it is believed that an "Old Home Week," under the auspices of this organization, will bring back scores of sons and daughters every year and give the old residents of the city and county something to look forward to.

**SIGN CONTRACT WITH COMPANY**

**City Commission Holds Brief Session Last Evening.**

Mayor Lucas last evening, following approval by City Attorney McCurdy, signed the contract with the Bismarck Water company under the ordinance recently passed. This marks the final step in securing adequate fire protection for the city.

Work will be started soon upon the two booster pumps, one for city protection and the other to protect the state capital.

Following the allowance of the regular bills, the commission adjourned to meet again next Thursday evening.

**GRIGGS COUNTY TELEPHONE TANGLE**

**Railroad Commissioners Give Relief at Yesterday's Session.**

The North Dakota Railroad commission met yesterday afternoon and evening in the Grand Pacific hotel and discussed matters of importance to railroad freight rates. Among the important questions considered were the coal rates. J. H. Rosen, a coal dealer of Mandan, presented a petition to the board for a lower state rate for shipment of Montana and Wyoming coal. In his petition, Mr. Rosen stated that the high freight rates made it impossible to compete with eastern soft coal dealers with shipments brought from the Great Lakes.

A lower rate is asked by Mr. Rosen so as to make it possible to deliver coal from Bismarck to points on the Soo and Northern Pacific and to enable outside dealers to ship coal to the capital city. The matter was held under advisement by the board.

**Evening Session.** During the evening session the board granted permission to the Griggs County Telephone company at Cooperstown to increase its rates for both business and residence 'phones and to charge for all long distance calls to and from Binford, Jessie and Cooperstown.

**Raise Rates.** The business 'phones were raised from \$2 per month to \$2.50, while the residence 'phones will be \$1.75, instead of \$1.50, or a rebate of 25 cents if paid before the 20th of each month. The long distance rates were fixed as follows: From Binford to Jessie, 10 cents; from Jessie to Cooperstown, 10 cents; and from Cooperstown to Binford, 15 cents.

This afternoon the commission will listen to a discussion of telephone bookkeeping, reporting and general regulation by Frank Pixley of Omana. The commission will also go to Center, Oliver county, Friday, to settle a telephone controversy there.

The Bell telephone was also granted an increase in rates for residence 'phones in Dickey, in consideration of the 24-hour service, which has only recently been introduced. The commission will go to Minot, December 6, to consider an application from the Berthold Farmers' Telephone company to connect with the Northern Telephone company at Minot. Representations will be heard at this time from the Merchant Telephone company at Flaxton, concerning a misunderstanding with the Queen City Telephone company at Ryder.

**BURGLARS BLOW NEW LEIPZIG SAFE**

New Leipzig, N. D., Nov. 15.—Burglars last night entered the general store of John Bassford at this point and blew up the safe. They secured less than \$100 in cash but made a good haul in jewelry from that department of the store, and which was stored in the big safe.

The noise of the explosion awakened many citizens living in the neighborhood of the store, and several men were seen running from the building. Sheriff Charles McDonald has arrived here and with the village officials has rounded up five suspects who have been doing work in the harvest fields in this vicinity.


