"THE CRIME OF '66." In 1866 Congress enacted a law which declared that any American built ships which had been licensed or otherwise authorized to sail under the flag of a foreign country during the Rebellion should not be permitted to come home and be recognized under the American flag and the protection of American laws.

This law is one of the interesting discoveries made by business men who have been inquiring into the question of "our lost merchant marine." Just before the Civil war the United States had one-third of the merchant shipping of the world, and was on the point of becoming the greatest maritime nation.

and an attempt was made to show that the President had heretofore "conferred" with Republicans upon important legislation. The anti-trust law and the banking law were especially named in this connection.

The fact remains, however, that the President has never "conferred" with Republicans except under stress of dire necessity. When the banking bill was rapidly going on the rocks in the Senate, a meeting was brought about between the President and Senator Weeks of Massachusetts; and the Senator, from his own business experience, was able to demonstrate to Mr. Wilson some of the fallacies of the law as it then stood.

It is not believed here that he will do more in regard to defense legislation. While it was not stated in so many words, the inference is plainly to be drawn from the White House announcement and its concomitant comment in well authorized quarters that the President is willing to be guided by suggestions of Republicans if they appeal to his judgment.

The indicated personnel of the "conference," however presages that the talking will not be all on one side. Senator Gallinger and Representative Mann have been advocates of an adequate national defense when the President and his party were opposed to it; and it is not probable that these men will consent to abandon measures which they have heretofore espoused in order to swallow in toto the plan which Mr. Wilson has proposed and to which there are many and valid criticisms as to its efficacy and workableness.

In addition, it is probable, when the proposed "conference" is held, that the President will be bluntly asked if he is asking Republican aid to pull him out of the preparedness pit into which he has fallen, and at the same time intends to favor closure in the Democracy in power.

Girl Ends Her Life

Fort Yates, Nov. 22.—On Friday of last week a very sad event occurred at Wapakala, S. D., when Miss Lucille Powell, a popular young lady of that place, committed suicide on Oak creek a short distance from her home.

Miss Powell was seen leaving her home early in the day but her purpose was unknown to all. Her long absence was noticed and a party of friends and neighbors set out in search for her. Later in the day the body was found by the side of the creek only a short distance from her home.

After a careful examination by a physician it was found that she had taken poison and her recovery was hopeless, and she died a few hours later.
