AHEARN-GIBBONS MILL A TREAT

Northwest Fans Will Have Good Chance to See Title Match.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 25.—In staging the Mike Gibbons-Young Ahearn ten-round fight at St. Paul Auditorium Friday night, December 10, the Capital City Athletic club is offering the boxing enthusiasts of the Northwest the greatest treat of the year.

To secure this big fistie attraction President Louis F. Dow of the Capital City Athletic club was obliged to outbid promoters from all over the country.

It took some nerve to put over the deal, too. The purse for this fight will be \$10,000, real money. Each of the battlers have been guaranteed a flat \$5,000, with the additional privilege of a percentage.

Take Some Nerve. In going through with this proposition Mr. Dow has taken a seat in the front rows, among the biggest promoters and matchmakers in the country.

If the Minnesota State Boxing commission agrees to allow a decision in this fight, and that body has been requested to do, the middleweight middle will be clarified.

Mike Gibbons today stands at the head of the middleweight division in America. His opponent in the big battle December 10 is recognized as the very best middleweight Europe boasts of.

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Fight promoters are striving to rush Fred Fulton of Rochester, Minn., in his progress to the heavyweight championship, but veterans of the game think if he is discreet he will refrain from accepting the match until he has eliminated most of the other aspirants for Jess Willard's crown and obtained needed ring experience.

"It looks as if Fulton and his manager are making a big mistake in seeking a match with Willard so soon," said a fight expert today. "He has not had sufficient experience to cope with Willard and a defeat will set him back tremendously."

"There are a great number in the east who are capable of giving Fulton a good fight and not until he has beaten them do I think him entitled or prepared to battle Willard for the laurels."

"Fulton by knocking out Anderson did not stamp himself as the logical heavyweight opponent for Willard. While the fight displayed his hitting power it did not demonstrate his real
