BLOOM APPOINTMENT

FIGHT CONTINUES.

Senator Gronna Will Call for Senatorial Action in Matter. Washington, Dec. 3.—One of the first fights in the coming session of congress will be started by Senator A. J. Gronna of North Dakota against Postmaster General Burleson. The senator is angry at the action of Burleson in appointing John H. Bloom as postmaster at Devils Lake. Bloom was nominated for postmaster at that place early in the Wilson administration, but because of the opposition of Senator Gronna the nomination was rejected. Then Bloom's wife was nominated and that was rejected by the senate. Mrs. Bloom was given a recess appointment last year and served until congress adjourned on March 4, when her commission expired by constitutional limitation. Then Postmaster General Hatton gave Mr. Bloom a recess appointment, and he is now holding the job.

Senator Gronna believes that the senate should show by affirmative action that the postmaster general's action in keeping both Bloom and his wife in this office will not be countenanced. Senator Gronna probably will introduce a resolution calling on the postmaster general for his reasons for appointing the Blooms after the senate had acted adversely on both names.

FORD CABLES POPE, AGENT HERE SAYS, BUT HE DENIES IT

Mme. Schwimmer Tells of Long Message Regarding the Peace Voyage.

New Ydrk, Dec. 3.—Henry Ford, whose volunteer associates in "getting the boys out of the trenches by Christmas" now number more than half a hundred, yesterday sent from Detroit, his home town, a long cable message to Pope Benedict XV, according to an announcement made at peace headquarters here, in the Hotel Biltmore.

Mr. Ford informed the Pope—so his aids here said—that he and a large party of American patriots would sail from this city next Saturday on the steamship Oscar II. Then he went on to inform His Holiness of the mission of the party.

The cablegram did not ask the Pope—so the Ford representatives here said—to send any representative to the peace meeting, nor did it ask him to express any opinion upon the project. It merely informed His Holiness what the plans of the Ford party were.

Mme. Rosaika Schwimmer, who is the leading woman member of Mr. Ford's party, was the one who told of the message to Benedict XV.

Is Sure of Pope's Approval. "I do not know what good the message will do," she said. "But I feel that His Holiness will be interested. After the peace conference of neutral women held in Europe last year, I visited Pope Benedict, with Miss Jane Addams, Dr. Alta Jacobs of Amsterdam, and Mme. Wilhelmine von Wuefben of the Hague. We learned from His Holiness that he approved of such neutral conferences. He told us that every effort he had made toward peace had failed and he hoped that peace would soon be established. I feel sure that Pope Benedict will urge all the neutral nations to cooperate with Mr. Ford's peace party."

Louis P. Lochner, who is manager of the Oscar II. expedition, returned from Philadelphia yesterday, after an interview with John Wanamaker, whom Mr. Ford would like very much to have accompany him on the cruise. Mr. Lochner said Mr. Wanamaker would probably give an answer to day.

Bryan Not Going Now. William Jennings Bryan is not going to start with the party, but may join it in Europe. The following message from him, sent from Miami, Fla., was given out at Ford headquarters yesterday:

I am heartily in sympathy with your proposed peace plan. It is worthy of all praise and will, I trust, accomplish much good. I deeply appreciate invitation and would accept without hesitation, but after earnest consideration of subject am impressed with the belief that just now I can render a greater service here opposing the plan to commit this country to a large and indefinite increase in expenditures for army and navy, a plan which would not only be oppressive to the taxpayers, but would, I believe, prove a menace to our nation's peace and influence.

I hope it may be possible for me to join your party at The Hague, if not earlier. If agreeable to you, shall come to New York Friday morning or evening to explain more fully.

A near-acceptance from a governor arrived yesterday, too. It was from L. B. Hanna of North Dakota. Mr. Hanna wired to say if the ship was positively going to sail from Hoboken on Saturday.

"If possibly can, I will arrange to be with you," his message added. Thus far no state or federal official has accepted an invitation to go.

Need a Whole Fleet. Hundreds of uninvited sent messages yesterday announcing their willingness to go.

"My word! If we took everybody who wants to go, Mr. Ford would have to engage a fleet," said Mr. Lochner. Among the new names added yesterday to the list of acceptances were those of Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, the famous Arctic missionary; Dr. David Starr Jordan and Mrs. Jordan, Mrs. William J. Thomas of Chicago, secretary of the National Peace party;

Ellis O. Jones, a humorous writer on the staff of Life; Leo Hexenbaugh of Lincoln, Neb., a neighbor of Mr. Bryan's, and Alfred Klifoth of Chicago.

A letter telling of the necessity of peace and urging that America set a good example by not taking up arms, "mistled by a hysterical cry of 'preparedness,'" was sent out from Mr. Ford's headquarters yesterday to each senator and representative of the country. Its concluding paragraph was:

"May we go forth from these shores with the assurance in our hearts that America will remain true to the traditions upon which it has been so firmly built and not yield to the blandishments of those patriots for profit who wish to put its fate in the hands of munition makers and military experts?"

FORD DENIES SENDING A PLEA TO THE POPE. Detroit, Mich., Dec. 3.—Henry Ford denied tonight that he had cabled Pope Benedict on world peace, but said that Louis P. Lochner or Cardinal Gibbons might have used his name in this connection.

Detroit, least of all cities, apparently, is taking kindly to the Ford peace plans. In the afternoon an aeroplane owned by J. Stuart Blackton of New York flew above the city tossing down fancy bomb-shaped advertisements for a moving picture preparedness show. This made Mr. Ford genuinely angry.

"I'll get after them," he said. "When I come back from Europe I'm going to find out who is paying to have these patriotic songs sung on the vaudeville stage; who is putting up the money for these war pictures and these preparedness movies. They may style themselves patriots for cash. You will find that it is the munition manufacturers who are back of it all, and I am going to show them up good and plenty."

Of his peace plan, he said: "When we get to Europe, we'll meet other delegates from neutral countries. Not all of us will stay over there, but some will. They will be permanent delegates, ready to hear any and all overtures from the warring powers."

Woman Peace Leader Sees Injury in Ford's Scheme. Annoyed at the published statements that she had accepted Henry Ford's invitation to be a member of his peace party, Mrs. Anna Garlin Spencer, vice president of the Women's Peace party and professor of sociology and ethics in the Meadville Theological school, has issued a statement saying she believes the Ford plan will injure the work of the organization she represents.

"Grotesquely Farical," Avers Chancellor Day. Chancellor Day of Syracuse in declining to send a student with the Ford peace party called the plan "grotesquely farical."

Such a Mission Fruitless, Says Nebraska Governor. Gov. Morehead of Nebraska today declined an invitation to be a member of the Ford peace expedition.

"Without the co-operation of the president and the backing of the governors of a majority of the states," Governor Morehead said, he felt such a mission would be fruitless.

Rhode Island Executive Declines Invitation. Gov. R. Livingston Beekman of Rhode Island, announced today that he had declined Henry Ford's invitation to accompany a peace commission to Europe.
