Suits—Tailored coat suits will be short with waist line tendencies and fullness or ripple effect below the waist and with turn-over collars and set-in sleeves.

Another and shorter type of suit (the Cote) will employ a loose jacket often embellished with embroidery,

Skirts—Whatever the style of the jacket, skirts will be full and short. Bands, folds or tucks will emphasize the full effect.

Separate Coats—Belted effects and deep yokes will give the new models of sport coats a very young appearance.

The cape collar on coats will be fashionable.

A longer type of coat is the Redingote, which employs waist line tendencies and is extremely full below the hips.

### OLD INDIAN FIGHTER HAS PASSED AWAY

Grand Forks, N. D., Dec. 27.—Chas. G. Williams, aged 86, veteran Indian fighter and stake driver of the northwest, died of old age at 5:30 o'clock Friday evening, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. William Gilbreath, 223 Euclid avenue.

The deceased was born in Maine, moving to Minnesota when but a boy. He fought the Indians in Minnesota in the Crow-Wing uprising of '62, and in other redskin wars.

In 1871 he moved to Washburn, N. D., running a stage line from that point through the then wild Dakota territory.

He removed to Ardoch, N. D., in 1897, being proprietor of a hotel at that place until five years ago, when he came to Grand Forks to live.
