

MANDAN BUSINESS MAN ANSWERS LAST SUMMONS

Louis M. Svihovec, aged 29, well known young business man of Mandan, died Friday night in the Mandan hospital, from pneumonia.

Deceased was born in Strakonice, Bohemia, Feb. 5, 1887, and came to the United States with his parents when 6 years old. Until seven years ago the family resided at Renville, Minn., and then came to Mandan.

He was employed for a time with the Cummings, Thorberg, Theis company, then took a position with John Foran in his grocery store. He learned the business and two years ago, when Mr. Foran was named postmaster, Mr. Svihovec purchased the business. This he has operated since, and his growing patronage was evidence of his success.

Deceased was a member of Mandan Lodge No. 1256, B. P. O. Elks, having been initiated Oct. 14, 1914. He is the third the lodge has lost since institution, four years ago. He was also a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters and was honored with the highest office in the giving of that order, being now a Past High Chief Ranger. He was also a member of the Knights of Columbus.

His parents, who reside in Mandan, and eight brothers survive. John Mushik, Jos. P. Schafer, John O'Rourke, John Tavis, Ralph Friesz and A. S. Brada will serve as pallbearers at the funeral Monday. They represent six members of the Foresters, four Knights of Columbus and three Elks.

The Elks will meet at the hall at 8:45 o'clock Monday morning and, joining with the brothers of the other orders, will escort the body to the church, where services will be held at 9:30 o'clock.


