CHANGES HIS VIEWS.
Henry Ford has returned from Europe convinced that the munition men of America have no more to do with prolonging the war than the peace banner that waved over Oscar II. It cost him a large sum and a nerve-racking trip across the sea to ascertain what to most people was an obvious fact. He returns with the conviction that the people of Europe themselves, not the bankers and the manufacturers of high explosives are behind the war. He should lose no time in communicating the findings to his friend, William Jennings Bryan.

CONSCRIPTION IN ENGLAND.
Great Britain has been forced to conscription. The terrible losses experienced in this war has necessitated this action. The gaps in the ranks at the front can be filled in no other way. Although the Asquith bill is a mild form of compulsory military service, the general situation in England is aggravated by serious political and economic complications.

IN THE GRIP OF THE GRIP.
Whether the grip, which is now incapacitating so many is due to the germ of pneumonia, as Dr. Emerson of the health department believes; whether it is caused by the grip germ which first invaded this country in the winter of 1889-90—or, at least, was first recognized then as something distinct from a severe cold—or whether it is to be attributed to the personal devil in whom Billy Sunday believes; whatever the source of the epidemic, we all know that it is here, and most of us wish it wasn't, even some of the overworked doctors whom it has driven to bed, as well as to prosperity.

Whether Dr. Emerson's diagnosis is correct or not is for his fellow physicians to say, but there will be general agreement as to his method of treatment among men who are in the habit of protecting their own health by precautions. He points out that the germs lurk in the throats of most healthy people—as is the way with most germs—but that it is only when the vitality is lowered by excess of dissipation, or of work, or by being deprived of air to breathe through too long continued presence in crowds, that the germs develop,

and the disease appears. The way to avoid grip, if this is true, is obvious. Get plenty of sleep, an abundance of fresh air, by keeping out of crowds so far as may be in the daytime and by sleeping with your window open top and bottom, eat simple and nourishing food and drink stimulants only sparingly.


