

UNIT PLAN REFERRED TO COMMISSIONERS

North Dakota Federation of Commercial Clubs Endorses System.

HERALD PLAN WAS TURNED DOWN FLAT

Members of the Better Farming Associations Were Present at Session.

The county unit plan of encouraging immigration was heartily endorsed by representatives of the North Dakota Bankers' association, who met in the Commercial club rooms yesterday.

tion's vote in favor of the movement was unanimously adopted, and Secretary R. F. Flint was delegated to leave last evening for Valley City, where today he will present a copy of the resolutions to the State association of county commissioners, in annual session there. Mr. Flint will address the commissioners in support of the resolution, and it is believed that real interest in the project will result from his visit.

The resolution reads as follows: WHEREAS there has never been in the history of North Dakota a period so favorable to immigration, and WHEREAS North Dakota's greatest need is closer cooperation with the farmer in the advancement of all farm interests; in procuring better farm labor and thrifter farm tenants; and in creating better markets and providing purchasers for idle lands which cannot now be operated profitably; and

WHEREAS the county unit plan of encouraging immigration, as now employed in certain counties within the State, and which contemplates the cooperation of every constructive interest under the direction of the county commissioners, appears to be best adapted to North Dakota's needs; therefore be it

RESOLVED that the North Dakota Federation of Commercial Clubs do respectfully petition the State association of county commissioners, now convened in Valley City, to give serious consideration to the adoption of the county unit plan, and the appropriation of funds for the proper financing of the same, as by statute provided; and be it further

RESOLVED that the North Dakota Federation of Commercial Clubs do pledge its earnest support and the assistance of its affiliated organizations, collectively and individually, to the success of this effort.

Other Counties Acting. Secretary Will E. Holbein of the Minot Association of Commerce reported that Bottineau county commissioners have appropriated \$2,200.00 per annum for immigration work and an equal sum for the maintenance of a county farm advisor. Last year the county commission published 25,000 booklets advertising Bottineau county farm lands. The number was found insufficient, and as it has been increased this year to 50,000. This work was initiated by the county commission, and it is producing results.

the work which his organization is doing. A year previous to the organization of the association, eighteen carloads of immigrant movables left Garrison. At the close of one year's work, it was found that not a single family had left the Garrison region, and with the beginning of a second year the tide had turned, and immigrants' movables were pouring in. The Garrison association at the start listed 70,000 acres of land at an average price of \$20.48. The second year only thirty-five quarter sections were listed, and the price had increased to \$28.00. The third year, but ten quarters were listed and the average price per acre had jumped to \$34.00.

Ward County Busy. Mr. Holbein told what the Ward county commissioners are doing in the way of publicity matter, and Mr. Sheehan of Cavalier county related the experiences of his community with
