agriculture in Kansas, said today in an address at the annual meeting of the Ohio board of agriculture. The grass serves the triple purpose, he said, of rejuvenating the ground in which it is grown, making a profitable crop and giving more nutriment for livestock than any other forage crop.

Dean Alfred Vivian of the college of agriculture, Ohio State university, told the farm institute workers, county fair managers and farmers who attended the meeting that soil fertility cannot be maintained without use of phosphates under all circumstances. The use of nitrogenous material and potash depends on local conditions, he said.

Other speakers on the program were, Governor Willis and President John Fegg of the state board of agriculture.

Mr. Coburn, referring to the benefit of alfalfa growing to soil, said: "Alfalfa roots penetrate the earth to depths unknown by any others. They assimilate mineral elements of the lower subsoils not otherwise available, bringing them to the surface converted into merchantable commodities. They drive their way downward in every direction and in the natural processes of decay a part of them are always dying. The soil is honeycombed with these vegetable pipe lines, through which the rains

filter and carry fertilization from the surface.

"The unique characteristic of this plant as a fertilizer is that it gathers ten times as much nitrogen from the air as it can use and the surplus is deposited in little nodules in the roots. To rejuvenate a tired or subdued a hard, dry, stubborn soil, shoot it full of alfalfa roots. They constitute the perfect deep tilling machine."

Mr. Coburn said lands worth only \$5 an acre have been sold repeatedly for \$40 or more an acre when sown in alfalfa. He quoted government reports to show that the per cent of protein in alfalfa hay is 14.3, as compared with 12.2 in wheat bran, 12.3 in clover, and 5.9 in timothy.

"Failures in growing alfalfa are caused only by carelessness by the farmer, Mr. Coburn asserted. He deplored the purchase of poor seed by many inexperienced alfalfa growers.

America has been made strong by the hog more than any other single influence, according to F. D. Coburn, secretary of agriculture in Kansas, who tonight addressed the final session of the Ohio board of agriculture's annual meeting on "Some Patriotic Considerations of the Hog."

"Hogs pay the taxes, clothe the family, send the children to school, and make possible the development of new homes," said Mr. Coburn. "They have provided the food for the Anglo-Saxon race. Without them Chicago would be a prairie village, Kansas City a barren hill, and Omaha a ferry crossing. Take away the hog and our banks would close and the wheels of commerce cease to turn.

The pig is a quiet, inoffensive, Christian sort of animal, symbolic to a greater extent of the peaceful virtues for which our nation is so conspicuous than is the roving, piratical eagle. The snout inverting the soil, is a symbol of peace and industry. The pig is a thrifty animal, turning to good account everything which comes his way, and a far better representative of the American character than the roving, robbing eagle.

The hog is a condenser; he is a manufacturer of hams, hash and head cheese, lard, illuminating oils, hair brushes, liver pudding, toothbrushes, glue, buttons, bacon, bristles, fertilizers and fats, knife handles, whistles, soaps, souse, side meat, saddle covers and sausage. He is a mint and the yellow corn of our country is the bullion he transmutes into golden coin.

"The American hog we have an automatic, combined machine for reducing the bulk in corn and enhancing its value. It puts ten bushels of corn in a space of less than a bushel measure and in so doing quadruples the value of the grain."
