Trenches in the Oslavia Sector, on the Italian front, which had been taken by the Austrians, recently were evacuated by the Austrian occupants owing to the concentrated fire of the Italian artillery, it was announced today by Austrian army headquarters in the official statement received here from Vienna.

Proclaim Martial Law. London, Jan. 17.—The Greek government in agreement with the king, will proclaim martial law this week, according to the newspaper, Kairos. The parliament, which will meet next Monday, is expected to ratify this measure.

The British and Russians in Mesopotamia and Caucasus are pressing the Turks hard. The army of King George, moving northward to the relief of the British forces at Kut-el-Amara, has driven the Ottoman to within six miles of the belligerent town on the TIGRIS.

COURT OF INQUIRY TO INVESTIGATE DISASTER

Washington, Jan. 17.—A court of inquiry was named by Secretary Daniels to investigate, determine the cause and fix the responsibility for the explosion aboard the submarine E-2 in the New York navy yard Saturday, which caused the death of four men and seriously injured ten others.

A navy yard board appointed by Rear Admiral Usher, immediately after the accident, reported to the department tonight that an investigation was continued today, but it was still too early to decide its outcome.

Members of the court of inquiry left Washington late tonight for New York and will begin the inquiry tomorrow. A report is expected before the end of the week.

PEACE PARY NOT ALLOWED TO TRAVEL THROUGH GERMANY

The Hague, Jan. 17.—Germany's refusal to permit members of the Ford peace board to travel through German territory to Scandinavia, has halted the board's peace plan. The members of the board today selected Stockholm as its regular meeting place, but so far appeals to the German minister at The Hague and to the Berlin foreign office for permission to cross Germany have been denied.

Cash prizes are to be given by the First National bank to school children who write the best essay or story on "Saving." Any scholar under the ninth grade may enter.

Root, superintendent of schools; Miss Sanderson, of the office of the state superintendent of public instruction, and Mrs. Budington, the secretary of the state library commission, will decide as to who will win the prizes.
