

FORD PEACE PARTY SAILS FOR STATES


Only Those Remaining That Are Connected With Permanent Board.

The Hague, via London, Jan. 17.—The American members of the Ford peace mission, except those associated with the permanent peace board, sailed from Rotterdam today on the steamer Rotterdam for New York.

About 150 persons sailed, while 30 remained at The Hague for the purpose of promoting the peace plan as originally devised. The members of the permanent board will hold daily meetings.

BRITAIN MAY BLOCKADE PORTS

Of the Central Powers and Obviate Diplomatic Troubles.
