FEDERATION BOARD MEET CLOSES AT GRAND FORKS

Mrs. Fred L. Conklin, vice president of the Eighth district of the Woman's Federated Clubs of North Dakota, and who attended the executive committee meeting of the federation, which was held in Grand Forks Thursday and Friday of last week, has given a very interesting report of the meeting, which is as follows:

"The board of directors and the advisory council of the North Dakota Federation of Woman's Clubs held its spring meeting in Grand Forks Thursday and Friday of last week. Miss Minnie Nielson of Valley City, president of the board, presided. Mrs. J. E. Featherstone, Valley City, corresponding secretary, and Mrs. H. G. Vick, Cavalier, treasurer, also filled their places. All other officers of the federation were present. Miss Mary O. Movius, Lidgerwood, one of the directors, and Mrs. Frank L. McVey of Grand Forks, were chosen to fill the unexpired terms of the board of trustees of the endowment fund.

"Mrs. H. L. Bolley of Fargo was appointed vice president of the Fourth district and Mrs. L. M. Cary of Mandan of the Seventh.

"Plans were made for the annual meeting of the federation in October and Mrs. Meyer of Valley City, Mrs. Minnie Budlong, Bismarck, and Miss McGinnis of Jamestown were appointed on the program committee.

"At the council meeting Mrs. E. F. Chandler of Grand Forks, as chairman of the Arts and Crafts department, appealed to the club women to encourage interest in beautifying their own towns and cities and to include some study of what is beautiful with that of the more practical.

"Mrs. Zimmerman, as chairman of the Public Health department, discussed the observance of "Baby Week", which has been proclaimed to be March 4-9. As this is a national movement in the interest of the child welfare campaign, the district vice presidents were urged to do all in their power to make the week one of interest in their districts, all organizations being urged to participate.

"Mrs. Zimmerman made many interesting suggestions which might be carried out in schools, churches, societies and clubs. The department offers a prize on the best essay on 'How to Care for the Baby.' The competitors must be a pupil in the grade or district schools. She urged pastors to preach on the importance of the movement on the Sunday preceding the week. A program has been arranged for the entire week and can be secured by communicating with Mrs. Zimmerman.

"Mrs. Wylie of Grafton discussed the problem of feeble minded children and showed the needs of proper and consistent legislation pertaining to their detention.

"Instead of waiting for the mid-year meeting to allow the new clubs to enter the federation, a membership committee consisting of Mrs. J. E. Featherstone, Valley City; Mrs. H. S. Oliver of Lisbon and Mrs. L. B. Dochterman of Williston was named and will take care of the entrance of new clubs.

"The board meeting Thursday was held in the Grand Forks library and the members were guests of the Entre Nous club for luncheon and of the Votes for Women club for dinner. Thursday evening a pleasing informal program of music and addresses of welcome was presented in the Guild hall.

WOMAN MAKING EXPLOSIVES
Miss Beatrice Rudawsky, graduate student at the University of California, is at work on experiments intended to give a vast increase of strength to high explosives. Within a few weeks she will complete the labor of months and, in perfecting her discovery, believes she will have a process that will result in the most powerful detonator of shells known to science.

Her experiments deal with a process which will create a volume of gas many times more terrific than that of "Explosive D," a secret American preparation used to explode shells when they strike an object. During her work Miss Rudawsky has succeeded in making a weak solution of hexa nitro-toluol. This was a substance is yellow and resembles needles. It is placed on the ends of shells to explode when the target is struck.
