
Church Social Tonight.

WORLD'S WORK.

The World's Work for February contains many readable articles of far-reaching importance and interest. Mr. Otto H. Kahn, perhaps the greatest banking authority on railroads, in his article, "What American Railroads Need" explains why, in his time of great prosperity, one-sixth of the railroad mileage in the United States is in the hands of receivers, and he lucidly reveals the remedies needed and heralds the beginning of a new era of mutual co-operation between the railroads and the people. Mr. Burton J. Hendrick's article, the third of a series, explaining the waste of the Pork Barrel system in our public buildings bill, is particularly timely—and he advocates the only feasible remedy—a budget system. Few people realize the importance of the affairs in Haiti or know that the United States has established a protectorate over that country. "Assassination and Intervention in Haiti," by George Marvin, reads like a melodrama—bloodshed, intrigue, and unrest—and all of it true. W. Morton Fullerton, in his article, "The Balkan Cauldron," reveals the facts that Greece offered to join the Allies in August, 1914, and that Rumania, after having had a defensive alliance for 33 years with Austria and Germany, by nearly a unanimous vote of its cabinet declared it could not sanction the uncalculated aggression of the Central Powers; and that she would not stand by the alliance. Two articles, profusely illustrated, show: one, the immense war trade and congestion of traffic in America—the other, by French Strother, "Our New Gold Goes Adventuring," the new ventures of United States capital in foreign fields. "Yuan Shih-Kai and the Throne of China," by Frederick Moore; "Henry P. Fletcher," our new ambassador to Mexico, by George Marvin, are two very timely and interesting sketches. Other articles are: "Corporation Schools," "In Search of a Candidate," editorials on the topics of vital importance at the present time, etc., etc.

SEEK POISONER OF BANQUET SOUP

Chicago, Feb. 14.—Country-wide search for Jean Cronos, former assistant chef in the University club, in connection with the mysterious poisoning of more than 100 guests at the Archbishop Mundelein banquet last Thursday night, continued with vigor today. The activity of the local police centered in localities known to be frequented by persons with anarchistic tendencies.

The authorities of New York, Detroit, St. Louis, St. Paul, and other cities, were asked to co-operate in the effort to find Cronos.

Unsuccessful efforts were made by the department to find the plant of an anarchist publication, through which they believed they might establish that Cronos was allied with a world group of anarchists which had plotted vengeance in Europe.
