

# GEO. J. SMITH ANSWERS LEAGUE

Declares Its Organ Would Muzzle All Sides But One.

REFUSED TO PRINT HIS ANNOUNCEMENT Plaza Editor Will Make Race in Spite of Leader's Refusal to Endorse.

Plaza, N. D., Feb. 16.—Geo. J. Smith, gubernatorial candidate, when seen today, made the following statement regarding the articles published in the Non-Partisan Leader:

"Yes, I have seen the Leader article, and was very much surprised to learn that it was a part of the league program to prohibit a candidate from asking the support of any league member. I am also surprised to know that it is considered bad form. The league officials claim that they have enough members to decide the next election; if this is true, their convention, to be held at Fargo in the spring, will be a deciding factor; it will make a joke out of the primary election law. The league evidently expects the common citizen of the state to sit back and wait for them to tell the people of the state just whom to vote for.

They intend to make some candidate a Christmas present of some 20,000 votes, and yet they do not want any candidate to hang up his stockings. Not Surprised.

I am not particularly surprised at the Leader. I have feared that the man who built up this organization would try to handle it. I knew that the destiny of the organization would rest with Mr. Townley, but I hoped that he would use his power for the betterment of the farmer of this state. Since the Leader has posed as the only paper in the state, that was manned by honest men, that was guided by honest motives and that was honestly trying to assist the farmers, we began to grow suspicious. There is something wrong with a man who climbs upon the Common Plow of Honesty, and crowds his fellows off, asserting that he alone is worthy.

Refused to Publish. Some time ago I sent the Leader my announcement, as I did all other newspapers in the state. They refused to publish it, while all the dailies and many of the small weeklies ran it. In talking with Mr. Townley he said that he would not run anybody's announcement. Here he is calling a convention to be gathered together without the people at home knowing anything about who are to be the candidates and not permit the voters at home to have a thing to say about who their delegate shall support. It is my humble opinion that the spirit of fair play will prevail with the voters of the state, whether any of its elements are embodied in the workings of the league bosses or not, and that at the coming primary election men will go to the polls and vote for their own choice. So long as the primary law is upon our statutes, the voters of this state will not have its work superseded by a private citizen.

"The action of the league will have no bearing whatever upon our future plans. I intend to reach the voters of the state direct and to them will I make my appeal."

# APPEAL FOR HELP FROM FLOOD DISTRICT

Over Thousand People Marooned by the Flood Waters at Newellton, La.

Natchez, Miss., Feb. 16.—An urgent appeal for help received here tonight from Newellton, La., where the Mississippi levee broke yesterday, said that a thousand or more people were marooned by the flood waters, with only a motor boat available to take them to safety. Three negroes had been drowned, it was said, and outside the town itself about 75 acres of farm land was inundated.

The government steamer, LaFourche, left here tonight with a number of small boats and rescue crews. Reports indicated that the gap in the levee at Newellton had widened to about 1,900 feet.

M. Jacoby, a Newellton merchant, telephoned from the flooded town tonight that the need of help was imperative, and that "water ranges from six inches to six feet in Newellton, and there is only one motor boat available to rescue a thousand or more persons marooned on the opposite side of Lake St. Joseph."
