

COMPLETE LIST OF NAMES FILED

Republican and Democratic Petitions Are Practically All Filed Now.

BALLOTS WILL CONTAIN ALMOST HUNDRED NAMES

Last of Names Will Be Filed Today and Primary Ballots Prepared.

Seventy petitions have already been filed with the secretary of state by candidates for offices to be voted on at the primary election, March 21. Practically all petitions have been filed, but mail delays will mean that a few names will be added to the list today.

The primary election will be held March 21, when presidential candidates will be selected, national committeemen, presidential electors and delegates to the national conventions of both republican and democratic parties.

HORSE RIDES CAKE OF ICE 35 MILES

Dickinson, N. D., March 1.—Owing to the rapidly rising water in the Yellowstone river in Montana, 29 head of horses were caught on a semi-island by the flood, and all perished with the exception of one, which in some unaccountable manner climbed onto a cake of ice, on which he floated for two days and two nights, until finally rescued at Glendive, after a journey over the turbulent Yellowstone for 35 miles. The horse was watched by people on shore during the greater part of the journey but was past all aid until the block of ice was whirled onto the flooded flats at Glendive. Several pictures were taken of the unusual riverpassenger while passing underneath the big bridge at Glendive. The animal stood up during the entire journey and seemed to brace its legs each time the ice cake was jarred by striking against other ice blocks.

should be no compromise. Congress will meet tomorrow, facing a clear cut issue with the president. The president's friends openly charge that resistance to his program is purely political. They make it unmistakably clear that he does not intend to let the question be passed over by a compromise and risk being embarrassed later with his negotiations with Germany by having the agitation come up again to weaken his hand. So far as the senate is concerned, the administration has no doubt. Even the proponents of the armed ship resolution admit that a majority on that side of the capitol stands ready to support the president. No effort to bring about a vote was made today, however, and it was indicated that action by the house probably would be awaited.

May Mean Break.
After many informal conferences upon the return of the leaders from the White House, the house foreign affairs committee held a two-hour session late in the afternoon and adjourned until 10:30 tomorrow morning, without taking any action. Mr. Flood made no announcement, but one of the committeemen said later that the president to receive the full committee at the White House tomorrow. It was apparent during the committee meeting that the controlling element was anxious to prevent the reporting of any resolution.

OIL INSPECTION LAW STANDS COURT TEST

Minnesota's oil inspection law yesterday was upheld by District Judge J. C. Michael of St. Paul in the suit of the state against the Pure Oil company to force payment of fees of \$9,191.20 for gasoline inspection. Judge Michael held that the inspection is an exercise of police power by the state and not taxation.

RECRUIT AMERICANS FOR BRITISH ARMY

Honolulu, March 1.—The money used in purchasing the discharge of more than 100 American soldiers and enlisting them in the British army was furnished by J. J. Hawshaw, a wealthy Australian rancher, according to Guy B. Randall, one of the three men arrested Sunday on a charge of complicity in the alleged plot.

Hawshaw said Randall left Honolulu last Saturday on the Hill liner, Great Northern, for San Francisco.

No evidence has been obtained that the British government is implicated in the alleged recruiting plot, according to the United States district attorney.

A three-day program has been arranged for a convention at Golden Valley, beginning March 7, of the Grange, Equity and Non-partisan league of Oliver, Mercer and Dunn counties.
