

**DAMROSCH AN INTERNATIONAL NAME**

Walter Damrosch, who will bring his great New York Symphony Orchestra to Bismarck Saturday night, April 1, for a concert at the Auditorium, comes into his musical prominence by long years of association with the good and great of the world of music.

The father of Walter Damrosch was the close friend and supporter of Wagner, Liszt and Berlioz and the dauntless champion of their then revolutionary music. The elder Damrosch along with Von Bülow, Hans Richter, and Cornelius composed a little band of idealists who devoted themselves to producing and popularizing the music of this master trio. Through his father, Walter Damrosch met both Wagner and Liszt and in later years became the foremost exponent of their music in America.

There is hardly a great piano or violin virtuoso who has not made his first appearance in this country under the baton of Walter Damrosch. He brought to America some of the greatest Wagner singers for his own opera company and for the Metropolitan Opera House of New York, among which might be mentioned Max Al-
