

MONTANA VOTES ON ROOSEVELT

Teddy Arrived Home Too Late To Get His Name Off Ballot.

FOURTEEN STATES HAVE SELECTED DELEGATES

Of 193 Delegates Chosen, Only 74 Are Instructed

Considerable interest attaches to the Montana presidential primary which will be held April 21. Col. Roosevelt's name will be on the ballot. T. R. returned too late from his zoological expedition to the Danish West Indies to prevent his friends from entering his name in the lists. It will be remembered that Former Senator Dixon of Montana was Roosevelt's floor manager at Chicago and led the bolt from the Coliseum to Orchestra hall, where the Bull Moose party was born. Mr. Dixon is now prominent in the Progressive party, but together with many other Progressives he is taking a part in the Republican primaries.

Women to Vote.

The women will vote in Montana's presidential primary. Politicians are watching with interest for the result of the first ballot to be cast by the women of Montana.

Fourteen states have selected delegates to the National Republican convention either by the primary method or by the convention system. They have made selections as follows:

Under the Montana law, as it is now understood, the names of Roosevelt, Hughes, Sherman, Burton, Cummins, Fairbanks, La Follette, and Weeks will be placed on the ballot. The vote may be small in its total as compared with the Republican strength in the nation, but the significance lies in the opportunity for a real showdown as between the admitted candidates.

193 Delegates Chosen.

At this stage of the pre-convention campaign 193 out of 385 delegates to the Republican national convention have been elected, including all state and district conventions held up to and including yesterday.

Nothing has happened to change the forecast that the uninstructed delegates will name the presidential candidate.

Senator La Follette by virtue of the North Dakota primaries, gets the instructed delegates for himself, as had been anticipated. The Montana pri-

AMERICAN TROOPS IN FINE FETTER TO HUNT DOWN THE BANDIT VILLA

Never in the history of the country has the regular army been called upon in time of peace to practice the war game as extensively as on the Mexican border during the past four years. The rank and file of the various branches of the army have been taught many new and practical lessons in the chaparral-covered country. In many instances they have endured hardship, that probably will not be met with to any greater degree in the actual campaign.

A protective force of more than 12,000 men has been scattered along the international lines. Conditions have been unusually favorable for testing certain new theories—theories which could not have been put into actual practice had the military units been confined to garrison duty.



maries will instruct that delegation for some individual. Every indication now portends that there will be no delegates from any other state or congressional district, aside from the favorite son states, instructed for anybody.

Can Be Tabulated Now.

Astute politicians, in Chicago for the meeting Monday and Tuesday of the national committee's subcommittee, were in substantial agreement that the tabulation of relative delegate strength as between instructions and noninstructions can be formulated as well now as on June 6, when the West Virginia delegates will be elected, the day before Chairman Hill will call to order the Coliseum convention.

This summary would show Sherman in the lead of instructed delegates, backed by the fifty-eight of Illinois. Cummins will have fifty-six, combining his state of Iowa with instructions he got by way of the Minnesota primaries.

Fairbanks Still Has His 40.

Fairbanks will have Indiana and Kentucky votes, making a total of forty. Burton is credited with Ohio's forty-eight and no other instructed delegates. Senator William Alden Smith is likely to get the instructions for thirty Michigan delegates. The Pennsylvania instructions are yet in doubt.

Col. Roosevelt's friends will not be surprised if there is a sudden combination in Pennsylvania that may instruct the seventy-six delegates for Roosevelt.

The Kansas and the Oklahoma conventions were the important features of the Republican week just ended. There were factional jangles in both of them. After all is said and done, the chances are that David W. Mulvane, former national committeeman, will control the destinies of the Kansas contingent.

"50-50" in Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma situation is about a fifty-fifty split between the old stand-patters and progressives. Oklahoma furnishes one of the live contests that will go to the national committee for adjustment while the temporary roll is being compiled.

At this stage of the proceedings the only southern contest comes from the Charleston district in South Carolina, on the fire is a statewide contest from Georgia. This will involve the delegates at large at least and probably all of the district delegates.

Complete delegations have been named in Florida, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Nevada, North Dakota and New Hampshire. The Indiana delegates have been instructed for Fairbanks, but the individual delegates will not be named until the state convention meets at Indianapolis on April 5.

Colonel Has Nothing to Say.

Col. Roosevelt returned from the West Indies, but made no political statement. Senator La Follette initiated a speaking campaign in Wisconsin, breaking open his campaign for presidential instructions against the determination of Gov. Philipp to have an uninstructed delegation in Chicago. Former Senator Burton made sever-

al speeches, and the impression got around that the Ohio man is to have the big end of the vote on the first ballot next June, due largely to the southern states.

The subcommittee on arrangements of the national committee made no headway. Its program, undoubtedly, was to name a temporary chairman for the convention. For reasons best known to all concerned, action was postponed until April 20, when Chairman Hill will reassemble the subcommittee in Chicago.

No direct primaries are to be had during the coming week, affecting the presidency. The Democratic national situation was absolutely undisturbed. Any doubt as to the renomination of President Wilson at St. Louis was dispelled by the open avowal of William J. Bryan in Nebraska that he is for Wilson all along the line.
