

NEW HOTEL FOR ANAMOOSE, N. D.

10,000 Structure Will Be Erected By J. J. Schmidt, One of the Leading Business Men

Anamoose, N. D., March 30.—Anamoose is now sure of a new hotel and modern garage, to be constructed just as soon as weather conditions will permit. J. J. Schmidt, president of the Anamoose National bank, will build the new hotel. This hotel will be built on the old Frankhauser block and the approximate costs of the same will be \$10,000.00. It will cover two business lots, will be two stories high and undoubtedly will be built out of brick, or some form of cement, at least.

New Garage.

The new garage will be built by the Schmidt, Gulack & Heitman company, automobile and implement dealers. It will be constructed immediately north of their present building, will be built out of cement blocks, will cover two

lots, and will be modern and complete in every respect. The amount of building to be done here this spring and summer is variously estimated at from \$40,000 to \$60,000. However, definite announcements regarding all buildings contemplated have not been made. It is almost sure that the Baptist church congregation will construct a new \$15,000.00 brick church. The construction of a number of dwellings, an implement house, another office building and enlargement of store buildings are said to be practically assured and it is expected that the builders will be able to make definite announcements shortly. The agitation for a municipal building has been in progress for sometime and may be brought to a head this summer.

ACUTE TONSILITIS CLAIMS MANDAN BOY

Ill for Three Weeks and About to Undergo Operation When Death Came

Mandan, March 30.—Charles Anderson, aged 23 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Anderson, first avenue northeast, passed away while about to undergo an operation at 5 o'clock last evening.

He was taken ill about three weeks ago with acute tonsillitis, which turned to an abscess of the throat, and was taken to the hospital for an operation. He fought taking the ether and the struggle resulted in a sudden attack of heart trouble that caused his demise. Attending physicians declared that septicemia, or the poisoning of the whole system and weakening of the heart was caused by the abscess of the pharynx.

Deceased was born on the farm five miles north of the city on October 27, 1893, attended the rural and city schools, and has been engaged at farm work since. He had also for several winters been a member of the river crew in charge of Captain Charlesworth, engaged in blasting stumps and other work along the Missouri.

The funeral services will probably be held on Friday afternoon, but further announcements will be made later.

HELGESON'S RIVAL OPENS CAMPAIGN

ANOTHER BIG MOTOR PLANT FOR BISMARCK

Bismarck Motor Company Will Build at Sixth and Broadway

The erection of another big automobile assembly plant for Bismarck was announced last evening by the Bismarck Motor Co., which has acquired three lots at the corner of Broadway and Sixth street, just opposite the municipal auditorium, and which will begin work on a handsome two-story structure as soon as weather permits.

The building, which will be used exclusively for an automobile assembly and repair plant, warehouse and sales rooms, will be two stories in height and will occupy a ground space of 8,500 square feet. The main part will be 140 by 50, with an "L" 30 by 50 feet.

Fire-proof Construction.
Fireproof construction will be used throughout; the front will be of glass of the most approved design, and the sales rooms will be equipped in an up-to-date manner which will make them among the most attractive in the northwest.

The building when completed will become the aristocratic home in this district of the Studebaker and the Cadillac, two cars which are enjoying an ever-increasing popularity. Chris Bertsch and A. B. Currier, the men behind the motors, report prospects for this season which warrant the elaborate construction program outlined, the steady growth in business making larger quarters imperative. The cost of the new plant will be in the neighborhood of \$30,000.00.

DEVILS LAKE MASONS TO DEDICATE \$50,000 TEMPLE ON MAY 18

Devils Lake, N. D., March 30.—Minesawaukan lodge, No. 21, A. F. & A. M., of Devils Lake, will host to every blue lodge man in northern North Dakota on May 18, the occasion for the formal dedication of the handsome new \$50,000 temple, which is looked upon as one of the finest lodge homes in the northwest, and easily the most complete structure to be found in a city the size of Devils Lake.

The dedicatory address will be delivered by Walter L. Stockwell of Fargo, grand secretary of the grand lodge of North Dakota and an orator of note.

The building was planned by Architect J. A. Shannon of this city. So acceptable has been the work that Mr. Shannon was last month awarded the contract to draw plans for a temple for Jamestown, which so far as the general ideas are concerned follow the building just completed. J. E. Jelsch & Johnson of Devils Lake had the general contract for the building, and despite a very severe winter, excellent progress was made.

Fine Structure.
Two stories above the ground, a basement and sub-basement furnish plenty of room. The heating equipment is housed in the sub-basement. The basement, or better the ground floor, contains a spacious ball and banquet room, capable of seating 500 at tables; a kitchen, fully equipped; a smaller dining room, and cloak rooms. The main floor contains an elegant lodge room with a 22-foot ceiling, set off with a large dome in the center, and balconies at the west. Suitable wardrobe, ante rooms and closets for paraphernalia a handsome ladies' parlor made pleasant by a large fireplace and a smoking room are found on the ground floor. The Red Cross room, Knight Templar room and other lodge rooms are found on the top floor at the front.

The building will be occupied in April. Devils Lake has five active Masonic bodies: Blue lodge, chapter, commandery, lodge of perfection and Eastern Star.

Washington News Notes

Washington, March 30.—North Dakota's delegation in the house of representatives, Messrs. Helgeson, Young and Norton, are in favor of the army reorganization bill. The only time over which there has been any particular controversy is the size of the enlisted force of regular soldiers. The Hay bill proposed an increase of 20,000, that is to say from 120,000 to 140,000. Representative Kahn of California offered an amendment to increase the number to 220,000. The amendment was voted down. Messrs. Helgeson, Norton and Young voting along with the committee to hold the number of enlisted troops according to the committee's recommendation at 140,000.

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Yeater of Hazelton, N. D., came up from Florida this week where they have been since the first of the year. They go from here to Ohio, and expect to reach North Dakota by May first.

Any community desiring to establish a rifle team, and military company for general drill, can get arms, ammunition, tents for summer encampment and a military instructor by writing to the war department, Washington, D. C. This is not generally known. There is no need to wait for legislation. Communities desiring to have a summer encampment should make application at once.

D., March 30.—Policies to be employed in connection with their opposition to the proposed referendum of the prohibition clause of the state constitution, and policies relating to other features of the anti-liquor crusade in this state will be settled at a meeting to be held in Fargo April 1 of representatives of the North Dakota Enforcement league, the state W. C. T. U., and the North Dakota Total Abstinence society. That the prohibition forces will endorse several candidates for positions, including a candidate for attorney general, is generally accepted.
