SHOW AT PRISON TO BE GIVEN TONIGHT

The entertainment to be given by the inmates of the penitentiary this evening promises to be unique. It is to be held in the prison auditorium and will begin at 8 o'clock.

Heretofore these entertainments were given once in two years during the legislative session, but it was decided to make them an annual affair.

With the exception of Miss Talcott and Master Sterling Reid, all parties participating in the entertainment are prisoners in the entertainment.

Arrangements have been made with the Soo line for a special train to and from the penitentiary, leaving the Soo depot at 7:30 o'clock and returning immediately after the entertainment. The fare for the round trip has been placed at the sum of ten cents.

The entire expense of arranging for these entertainments is paid by the prisoners out of that portion of their earnings credited by law to their general benefit fund. This fund provides for all expense of the entertainments given at the penitentiary throughout the year. An admission fee of 25 cents for this entertainment will be charged and the net proceeds will be credited to that fund.
