ANGER OF FLOODS IS STILL A MENACE

Missouri and Red Rivers Are Very High and Lowlands May Be Inundated.

Should a gorge which holds near Ft. Clark give way and let the great masses of water which are dammed back of it, floods may do considerable damage to the low country in this vicinity and Mandan. At present the river is full of huge cakes of floating ice.

Gorge Broke.

Sunday noon a gorge in Shell creek 30 miles north of Berthold and 30 miles south of Sanish, tore loose and swept out the gorge at Sanish. Ice, however, gorged just below Fort Clark and last night the water rose to a height never known there previously.

viously. The water was within two feet of the elevators, which are located on the bluff overlooking the river. Below Ft. Clark the water dropped, and Washburn reports that it lowered three feet last night. The gorge at Washburn is breaking up.

Ice gave way in places and there was a considerable quantity running at noon today at Mandan.

Creek Up.

Square Butte creek began running again last night and today, according to information received by long distance, and is almost as high as the high mark set previously this spring.

All of the bridges which were recently washed out between Yucca and the Morton county line were to have been replaced today, and officials are congratulating themselves that the work had not been started.

Should Take Action.

That immediate action should be taken to relieve the danger of half a dozen or more houses and other property being washed down stream by the flood waters of the Heart river is the claim of a delegation of Park addition citizens who called at the Mandan Pioneer office this afternoon.

The river bank has been cut out for 20 feet in one place and the Frank Erucker residence is now hanging over the river. He has only about 50 feet of his lot left.

The Hoffman residence, owned by Matt Zahndler, located on the river that the Northern Pacific can relieve conditions by digging a channel through the property owned by Cantwell, Cary & Solum, is the assertion
