

### J. H. FRAINE IN RACE TO FINISH

Stated to Tribune Representative That He Had No Intention of Withdrawing.

Lieutenant Governor John H. Fraine arrived in this city Friday morning on belated No. 1 and nearly at day Friday he was engaged in business matters at the adjutant general's office at the capitol. Mr. Fraine is a candidate for governor and when asked if the reports circulated about his withdrawal had any basis, he said "I am in the race until the end. I have no intention now of withdrawing nor of doing so later on." Mr. Fraine will stay in Bismarck for the next couple of days and then return to his home at Grand Forks.

#### RIVER LOWERED SIX FEET.

Fargo, N. D., April 14.—Flood conditions in Fargo and Moorhead are now past the serious stage. Since the river reached its crest, over a week ago, the water level at this point has fallen six feet, today the gauge at the south bridge registering 25.9 feet. The high point attained during the flood was 29.9 feet.

However, there are still a large number of families on both sides of the river here that are out of their homes on account of the high water. A few moved back into their houses when the water receded, but it is expected that the large majority will be homeless or probably the next ten days.



Dickinson tendered Rev. E. H. Craig a reception. He was presented with a purse of gold. Rev. Craig is meeting with great success here in his new field.






