## CLEAN-UP AND PAINT-UP CAMPAIGN TO OPEN SOON

Every Effort Will Be Made to Have Bismarck Become the Spotless Town.

### EVERYONE SHOULD JOIN MOVEMENT

Commercial Interests Are Wide Awake to Necessity of This Big Week's Work.

Everything is set for the great Clean-up and Paint-up campaign, April 23-30, which is to give Bismarck a new Easter dress.

A final meeting of the Commercial Club City Beautiful committee with the ward committees of the senior organization and of the Junior Chamber of Commerce was held this week, and plans for the "drive on dirt" were completed. Every ward was well represented, the showing of the Junior Chamber being particularly gratifying, and to stimulate friendly rivalry between the various committees it was suggested that the Commercial Club and Junior Chamber of Commerce be employed to enforce these commands, if necessary, but Commercial club is convinced that there is not a citizen in Bismarck so lacking in personal and civic pride as to require more than the stimulus which will be imparted by the Clean-up and Paint-up campaign.

The official program for the week is published elsewhere in this issue. This may be followed when convenient, but it is not intended that it shall be absolutely binding. It is an outline which has been followed with success by other cities in similar campaigns, and it gives a general idea of the work to be done during the week.

**Wagons Will Be Available.** The Commercial club has taken steps to assure the availability of an abundance of wagons during the week, and householders are requested to notify the club as soon as their clean-up is completed, in order that there may be no delay in the collection of the debris. A uniform charge of 50 cents per load or fraction thereof will be made, and the Commercial club is ready to guarantee that the teamsters will do their share of the work thoroughly.

Property owners are also requested to report to such vacant lots overrun with weeds or other nuisances in their neighborhood, and these matters will receive immediate attention. With the authority which is invested in the police department of Bismarck by the city's health ordinances, there is no reason why this clean-up should not be made complete.

**Photographs to Be Taken.** Photographs of various districts will be taken before the beginning of the campaign and preserved for comparison with views of the same premises after the clean-up is completed, as an object lesson in what can be accomplished by concerted effort. Suitable prizes or certificates of merit will be awarded the young people who accomplish the greatest improvement about their own homes.

The public and parochial schools will be asked to devote some time Friday to a discussion of the Clean-up and Paint-up campaign and the benefits which it will produce. Pastors of all the Bismarck churches will be asked to refer to Clean-up and Paint-up week in their services next Sunday. Merchants will be urged to notify their customers by brightening up their store fronts; removing dilapidated awnings, posters and signs; a general raid will be made on posters stickers and cards which have to come to
