TEDDY MAKES POOR SHOWING

Helena, Mont., April 21.—Scattered returns received tonight from today's primary election showed that President Wilson polled more votes than all his republican opponents together.

BERLIN'S REPLY TO OUR NOTE NEXT WEEK

Few Engagements Are Reported Along West Front in France.

RUSSIANS CONTINUE THEIR OFFENSIVE

Defeat of British in Tigris Region by Turkish Forces Is Noted.

London, April 21.—Next week is set by unofficial advices from Berlin as the time when it is probable Germany will make reply to the American note demanding discontinuance of Germany's present method of submarine warfare on pain of severance of diplomatic relations.

No Engagements. No infantry engagements have taken place around Verdun, although Paris records the occupation of a portion of a crater made by a German mine in the Argonne forests.

Continues Offensive. Petrograd reports that the Russians' Caucasus army continues on the offensive against the Turks in Asia Minor.

Another defeat of the British in the Tigris region near Felahie is recorded by Constantinople.

Thirty Killed. Bordeaux, France, April 21.—Thirty persons are believed to have been killed in the explosion of a powder branch of a grenade factory here today.

ROGER SULLIVAN IN THE SADDLE

Springfield, Ill., April 21.—One fellow "No" on resolutions endorsing President Wilson and the administration headed by Governor Dunne was the only inharmonious word raised in the democratic state convention here today.

Neither the note nor any reference to it has been published in Germany, and there is no intimation when the note will be made public.

UNITED STATES WANTS PEACE, BUT NOT AT COST OF HONOR

Tokio, April 21.—Japanese opinion as expressed by the newspapers is sympathetic and welcomed the American note to Germany demanding a discontinuance of submarine warfare.

GERARD HANDS NOTE TO JAGOW; NO COMMENT

Washington, April 21.—Ambassador Gerard, at Berlin, cabled the state department today that he had delivered the American note on submarine warfare to the German foreign office at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Sees Von Jagow. Ambassador Gerard is known to have entered into a brief conversation with Foreign Minister von Jagow, after delivering the communication.

Probe Parral Incident. With this report as a basis, the Parral incident will be treated as a matter entirely separate from the suggestion of the de facto government that the troops be withdrawn.

Message From Scott. A brief message from General Scott reporting his arrival at San Antonio was received tonight by Secretary Baker.

MARKING TIME. Columbus, N. M., April 21.—While the American forces in Mexico marked time today, awaiting the outcome of the conferences to be held in San Antonio between Major General Hugh L. Scott and Major General Frederick Funston, preparations were made here to continue operations from this base.
