MIDLAND PLANS AN EXTENSION

From Jamestown to Spiritwood Lake and Clements-ville.

Jamestown, N. D., April 22.—The tentative improvements and changes of special importance to Jamestown and Stutsman county will be made this year by the Midland Continental railroad, it is understood, from reliable sources of information. Included in the changes are the extension of the railroad further into the city, as close to the Northern Pacific right of way as possible, to bring passengers and freight to the center of town, and also the building of a new line from Jamestown north to Spiritwood lake. The inland town of Fried will probably be on the new line and a line will also be run from Spiritwood lake to Clements-ville, on the present Wimbledon extension. The through trains on the Midland will then be run north from Jamestown via Spiritwood lake, instead of doubling back to Jamestown south of the city and east and

north via the present round-about route. The present line between Jamestown Junction and Clements-ville will be continued only to give local service, principally for freight, and will serve as a feeder for the main line. A new up-town depot at Jamestown will be built in accordance with the plans proposed.

The exact route of the right of way of the Midland from its present terminus north and west into the city together with the crossing of the Northern Pacific on the route north-east to Spiritwood lake were not given out by the Midland officials, as it was stated that two or three different routes were under contemplation. It is believed, however, that the line between Jamestown and Spiritwood lake, via Fried, will practically parallel the first preliminary survey made several years ago. This will give a fine service between Jamestown and the lake and Fried and pass through a well developed farming country.

Other work announced by the company for this year will include improvements in the yard facilities at Edgely, graveling and ballasting the headend and the installation of new culverts, etc., with increase in equipment. It is estimated that about \$250,000 will be expended in the changes along the line this year. It is hoped to have the Spiritwood lake extension completed by fall.

MAY ESCAPE TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Chief Witness Against Montana Man Under Arrest in Minneapolis Is Dead.

St. Paul, April 22.—Although Edward E. Bullock, of Bismarck, under arrest in Minneapolis on a charge of stealing automobiles, is wanted in Billings, Mont., on a charge of murdering his wife, he may not be tried there because of the death of the chief witness against him.

His wife was poisoned at Laurel, Mont., and died in a sanatorium at Des Moines. At one time she was ill in a hospital in St. Paul.

Wife Taken Sick Here.

Bullock, who is alleged to have lived in Roundup, Mont., under the name of Joseph E. Hunter, went to Billings in March, 1915, and moved to Laurel March, 1915, accompanied by his 15-year-old son and a woman who is alleged to have passed as Mrs. Bullock. His wife was sick in a St. Paul hospital, but was taken to Billings and one night at midnight was taken from a hospital in Billings in

an automobile by Bullock and removed to her home in Laurel, where she was kept confined in a room.

It is alleged that she was kept under the influence of drugs for days at a time and that she was held by threats and intimidation. When the remainder of the family was away on April 15 she escaped to a neighboring house and told her story.

The authorities were notified, but before they arrived Bullock, the boy and the other woman made a getaway in an automobile.

They were chased for some time, but finally pursuit was given up. Later Mrs. Bullock was sent to friends in Iowa and about two months afterwards she died in a sanatorium in Des Moines.

FIFTY BARREL FLOUR MILL ASSURED AT TOWNER

Minot, April 22.—Towner, April 17.—Joseph A. Seifert states that the machinery for the flour mill he will establish in Towner has been purchased and that as soon as a site is procured and material assembled construction work will begin.

The mill is to be fifty barrels capacity of the midget type. Mr. Seifert, who is an experienced mill and elevator man, has thoroughly investigated this system and has found it uniformly successful.

The location of the mill in Towner will mean much to the community and is an improvement that has long been desired. Mr. Seifert is a man of excellent reputation, thoroughgoing and a hard worker, and there is every reason to believe that he will make it a success.

NORTHWESTERN HOTEL WAS DOUBLY RAIDED

Minot, April 22.—The police raided the Northwestern hotel, conducted by C. A. Muller, last Saturday night and arrested eight men and three women, some of them colored and some white. The charge against Muller is that of keeping and maintaining a common nuisance. The charges against the inmates and frequenters of the joint are disorderly conduct. Among the women arrested is a negro, a cousin of the colored wife of the white proprietor.

Last night another raid was made on the place and eight men were arrested, among them being Fuller, the proprietor. He was released on \$50 bail in each instance for a hearing later before Police Magistrate Lynch. Fuller has been a frequenter of police court during the last few months and is persistent in his violations of the law.

TRIBUNE OF 1873 INTERESTS MANY

Paper Edited by Col. Lounsberry Contains Many Names of Old-Timers.

The curator of the state Historical society, has found among the many old files in the museum, a copy of the Bismarck Daily Tribune dated August 13, 1873. It is the sixth number issued as a daily and bears the following Vol. 1, No. 6, and is edited by Col. Lounsberry.

Among the features of this old paper which is 43 years old, can be found an advertisement of the Northern Pacific railroad and one of the Northwestern and Green Bay line. In the latter it calls attention to the safety appliances as airbrakes and Miller platforms, also the Pullman palace cars which were used for night time only.

Dash Is Dead.

Among the news items is the obituary of Col. Lounsberry's old dog Dash. Rosser's Drug store at that time flourished and S. A. Dickey, post trader; Fred Strauss, uncle of Dr. F. B. Strauss, advertising jewelry; The Capitol Hotel, R. R. Marsh, proprietor; Watson & Goodhue, Clothiers; D. C. Smith, photographer; Williams & William, attorneys at law; John Mason, Billiard Hall, fancy liquors and cigars; M. O. Dutton, contractor and builder, are mentioned in the columns of the old paper.
