I want to go home.


I want to go back to the little house

### SKOVGAARD HAS HUMOROUS VEIN.

Skovgaard, the Danish violinist, has a humorous vein in his make-up that allows him to enjoy ludicrous situations that would exasperate the ordinary musical genius, and it is this same humane side of his life that influences him to follow the performance of a most classical selection that has met the enforced hearty applause of an audience because it is the proper caper, with familiar and heart-reaching melodies that entrance and hold his listeners breathless with spellbound attention. And it was at the Tracy performance that the distinguished artist found humor in his heart's content in "Indecent" situations. A bum piano, minus one pedal, awaited his accompanist, who pronounced performance thereon impossible, whereupon Skovgaard announced a suspension of the program for half an hour till the piano could be repaired. This accomplished, the lady seated herself with graceful pose on a bum piano stool, when it collapsed, and the artist was distributed over the floor. The next calamity came from a bursted water main that promised to flood the auditorium, and later a mouse was discovered running about the floor, which caused consternation among the fair sex, a swishing of skirts and elevation of feet in the chair rounds. Just as the press agent was shouting a stage whisper from the wings, saying: "Well, they is having a hell of a times," there was a commanding knock at the door, when the imperious Skovgaard shouted, "Come in," without moving an expressive muscle, deviating his bow or skipping a note on his Stradivarius, while the heartily welcomed Rubie plodded along to his seat. But harring these incidents, Skovgaard says he had an appreciative audience.


#### To Take the Veil.

#### THE DANISH OLE BULL.

Ex-Governor Davidson of Wisconsin, gave a reception in honor of Skovgaard, after his company had entertained over three thousand of Madison's people at two public concerts. The reception at the Executive Mansion proved to be one of the social events of the season. The Governor's house was the home of the great violinist, Ole Bull, and is consequently one of the "historical houses" of Madison. Much of the interesting history of Ole Bull is connected with this house. At the Governor's reception, which was attended by about one hundred prominent Wisconsin people, Skovgaard was asked to play on his Stradivarius. Selecting the very spot on which Ole Bull had stood and captivated hundreds of his friends with his wonderful playing, Skovgaard played Ole Bull's masterpiece, Saeterjensens Song—"The Chalet Girl's Sunday. It seemed as though the spirit of the old master was present. It was like being back again in the days of Ole Bull. The same house, the same room, and the same melody—the same music touch, the same exquisite tone, the same imposing personality. But it was Skovgaard, the Danish Ole Bull, at the Auditorium, Friday, April 28.

Mr. Skovgaard Who Has This Precious Instrument, Will Appear Here.

A GENUINE OLD STRADIVARIUS

It Looks as Well Today as it Must Have Appeared the Day It Was Finished.

Violins may not have the sentiments and ensibilities attributed to them by imaginative musicians, but they have histories, interesting and varied, gay romances and dark tragedies, even as do their warm friends of mankind. A violin which is not only remarkable in itself, but with a remarkable story is the one possessed by Axel Skovgaard, the violinist. It is as bright and polished as if it had left the hands of its maker but yesterday, and still the instrument is nearly 200 years old. In spite of its age it retains the original varnish as applied by the skillful hands of Antonius Stradivarius, without a flaw or scratch. Looking very young and new, it is among the oldest violins in existence, as it is the most famous and costly. But more remarkable than its age and fine state of preservation is the fact that the first person to play upon it was Mr. Skovgaard himself, and as he is a young man, making no pretence of having attained perfect youth, the story is naturally most unusual one.

To chance meeting with a London dealer in musical instruments Mr. Skovgaard over his good fortune in obtaining his rare Strad. This man had a fine collection of Italian violins, among them being masterpieces by Amati, Stradivarius, Guarneris, Gergonz and Guadagnini. They were real antiques, cracked, scratched, scraped and worn through more or less rough life for several centuries. Having revealed in the wealth before him and tried most of them, Mr. Skovgaard remarked that it would have been pleasure to have seen such instruments when they were new, but such pleasures were denied modern artists.

To the surprise of Mr. Skovgaard, his new friend replied in the negative and stepped to a fireproof vault and came out with a big yellow leather case, which he opened and took out an unstrung violin and handed it to his guest.

Apparently, it was just from the maker's shop, "but being it was lettered, 'Antonius Stradivarius, Anno 1712.'"

"I could not believe my eyes," says Mr. Skovgaard, "but stood as one in a trance. As I stood there with the handsomest of all violins in the world in my hands I was carried back as it in a dream to the days of the great violin makers."

Mr. Skovgaard was naturally more than ever desirous of purchasing the instrument and finally obtained his father's consent to the payment of \$12,000. Before it changed hands the instrument was examined by famous experts in Paris and Italy, who pronounced it genuine. Mr. Skovgaard also told how, at the last, the Spaniard wished to withdraw from the contract, but was held to it by the London solicitors of the Copenhagen family. "The violin," he adds, "fulfilled the most enthusiastic expectations, as all will believe who have heard its tone."

It is on this wonderful violin that Skovgaard will play at the Auditorium on Friday evening, April 28.
