BISMARCK IS THE LEADER

Revised State Road Map Received by the Commercial Club.

CAPITAL CITY NATIONAL HIGHWAY CENTER OF N. D.

Only City in This State With Roads Radiating Over Six Paths.

The revised state road map of the National Highway association, just received by the Commercial Club from the national headquarters at Washington, gives Bismarck undisputed leadership as the national highway center of North Dakota.

In addition to the Red Trail, extending due east and west from the Capital City, lines are shown radiating northwest to Killdeer and Williston southwest to Minot, connecting with the Yellowstone trail at Hettinger; north to Minot, via McClusky and south to Aberdeen, via Hazelton and Linton.

All of these are full-fledged national highways, regularly established by the National Highway association, and shown upon all of its maps and other publicity matter.

Much National Highway.

The new North Dakota road map shows 2,100 miles of national highways in the Flickertail state. The association, taking the last federal census figures, gives North Dakota a population of 577,056, of which a contiguous 474,944, or 82 per cent, located in 34 traversed counties, is served by national highways. The public roads in North Dakota show a total mileage of 61,593, of which only 2,100 miles, or 3.4 per cent of the total is regarded as national highway material.

Bismarck is shown to be the only city in North Dakota with national highways radiating in six different directions. These national highways directly connect the capital city with Minot, Devils Lake, Grand Forks, Fargo, Dickinson and intermediate points, including every large center of population in the state. The National Highway association is seeking

national assistance in the building of all of these roads, one of which—the Red Trail—forms an important link in the proposed National Defense highway, which is to gird the nation.

Great Plains Highway. Second in importance only to the Red Trail, and the shortest and most direct of all north and south continental highways, is the Great Plains road, fully chartered for the first time by the National Highways association, and shown on a special map which has been supplied the Commercial Club.

The Great Plains highway extends from Portal, on the Canadian border, to Brownsville, Texas, on the Gulf of Mexico, the larger towns touched by the trail are: Minot, Bismarck, Pierre, North Platte, Neb.; Colby and

The Great Plains road traverses six states; touches two state capitals, 64 counties and 51 county seats, serving a population of 1,227,212. He distance by highway from Portal to Brownsville is 2,550 miles, and by rail, 2,225 miles. Naturally, the Great Plains road will intersect every transcontinental highway in western America.

Much Travel on Red Trail. The National Parks Highway association writes from its general headquarters at Spokane that a record-breaking amount of tourist travel is promised for the coming season. Last year more than 3,400 parties visited the northwest. This year it is hoped to increase that number several fold. Inside of two or three years, it is predicted, hundreds of thousands of people in the middle western states will be planning summer vacation trips with their machines. It is urged that the northwestern states, with their national parks, scenic beauties and good roads can get this business, which will mean hundreds of thousands of dollars spent in towns along the way.

To assure the National Parks Transcontinental highway its share of this business, the association is planning intensive organization along the entire route of the Red Trail. An effort will be made to raise a fund of not less than \$5,000 per annum for publicity, and every community affected will be expected to assist.

Within a few weeks Bismarck will enjoy a visit from the National Highway association's field corps, which will deliver an illustrated lecture on the Red Trail at the municipal auditorium. The slides which have been prepared for this lecture illustrate beautiful spots all along the line of the Red Trail, the Missouri valley included, and it is expected that an attentive audience will greet the lecturers here.

FORCE LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM THROUGH

Washington, April 24.—Aroused by Minority Leader Mann's success in keeping the army bill, as amended by the senate, from going to conference, house leaders declared tonight that without delay they would force their legislative program through with the aid of special rule. A rule which discharge the military committee from further consideration of the army bill, and to permit the speaker to appoint house conferees, after debate on motion to commit, will be reported by the rules committee tomorrow. The majority of the committee will suggest an hour's debate on the motion, but if this is not agreeable to the republican minority, debate will be limited to 20 minutes on each side.

PUNITIVE EXPEDITION AWAITS CONCLUSION OF CONFERENCE

(Continued from page 1) According to the same source there were 2,000 United States soldiers camped at San Antonio, 60 miles southeast of Naniqua, with a very large quantity of supplies. It is said that at present there are not more than 200 troops at San Antonio, the remainder, together with most of the supplies, having been withdrawn north.

The news of the coming Scott-Obregon conference was received with obvious satisfaction by the Mexican officials in Juarez. They profess confidence that it means an early recall of the American troops from Mexico.

Routine Dispatches. Reports that the American administration had decided to retain the expeditionary troops in Mexico until the Carranza government demonstrates its ability to capture or crush the Villistas' bands, resulted in no demonstration along the American lines of communication so far as it could be learned tonight.

Only routine dispatches arrived here from General Pershing at the front. Nothing in them, it was said, indicated any renewal of activity on the part of the American command and nothing tended to support a rumor that troops of the Tenth Cavalry had been engaged near Satevo.

Unofficial reports reaching here today that Villa and a few adherents are recuperating from the long, hard flight before American cavalrymen, in the mountains northwest of Parral, were substantiated by press dispatches from the front, which said the bandit leader was last reported near Mononava, in the Sierra Tarahumara.

CARRANZA'S GENERAL TO MEET SCOTT

San Antonio, April 24.—Gen. Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff of the United States army, and Gen. Obregon, Carranza's minister of war, will formally discuss at El Paso or at some other point agreed near there, the question that has arisen because of the en-

Gen. Scott received his instructions to be there late today, after he had already secured his transportation and made his reservations on a train for Washington. He had intended to leave here for the east in the morning. Gen. Scott would not discuss the character of his instructions.

Not to Withdraw Troops. Incident to this discussion, it is expected that the further occupation of Mexican territory by Gen. Pershing's force will be discussed.

Gen. Scott has made it clear that he is in thorough accord with the administration in its determination not to withdraw the troops for the present. Gen. Funston sent to Gen. Pershing today the preliminary orders for the reconcentration of his troops along the lines he had recommended, and which had been approved. The new disposition of troops, it is expected, will serve the purpose not only of defense, but will enable Gen. Pershing to make a rapid and quick move in any direction.

VILLA LOCATED AGAIN.

Reports from Gen. Pershing today indicated that Francisco Villa had been located again, this time west of Parral, in the mountains of western Chihuahua. He was last reported at Nonoava, 85 miles from Satevo.

Unofficial reports today indicated that Carranza had sent gradually into the north an army much larger than that of the American force, and a

IOWA MAN IS LEADING FORD

Omaha, Neb., April 24.—With the count of the vote cast at the preferential primaries nearly completed, Senator Albert B. Cummins of Iowa is leading Henry Ford of Detroit for the republican presidential nomination by 1300 votes.

GREAT INTEREST IN N. J. PRIMARIES

Trenton, N. J., April 24.—Interest in New Jersey's presidential primary election tomorrow centers in four of the 12 districts, where there are contests for district delegates to the republican national convention.

In these districts, one set of candidates favors the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt, and the other set is unpledged. There are only four candidates for the four positions as delegates at large to the Chicago convention and all are running without designation. Only four candidates for the delegate at large on the democratic side appear on the ticket and they are grouped to favor the renom-

ination of President Wilson. With the exception of the Seventh district, there are no contests for delegates to the convention and all are understood to favor President Wilson's re-nomination.
