GERMAN NOTE IS ACCEPTABLE TO WASHINGTON

(Continued from Page One) It takes it for granted that the Imperial German government does not intend to imply that the maintenance of its newly announced policy is in any way contingent upon the course or results of diplomatic relations be-

tween the government of the United States and any other belligerent government, notwithstanding the fact that certain passages in the Imperial Government's note of the 4th instant might appear susceptible of that construction. In order however to avoid any possible misunderstanding, the Government of the United States notifies the Imperial government that it cannot for a moment entertain, much less discuss, a suggestion that respect by German naval authorities for the rights of citizens of the United States upon the high seas should in any way or in the slightest degree be made contingent upon the conduct of any other government affecting the rights of neutrals and non-combatants. Responsibility in such matters is single, not joint; absolute, not relative.



WON HIS ITALIAN AUDIENCE

Maeterlinck Tells How Jules Destree Made Friends for Belgium's Cause in City of Naples.

Maurice Maeterlinck, the great litterateur of Belgium, tells in London Everyman's of visits which he paid Italy in a propaganda conducted by two Belgian deputies, Jules Destree and George Lorand, and describes Italian audiences. He says the Italian is generous, courteous, hospitable, exuberant, enthusiastic, but very proud and touchy; that he knows his worth; that he knows that his is the oldest civilization, and he recognizes the right of no other nation to teach him his duty. Describing a meeting at Naples, he says: "At the last moment we had been warned that, though we might speak of Belgium and her suffering, any definite allusion to war or overviolent attack on the people from beyond the Rhine would excite controversy and only damage our cause. Being myself no orator, I had only my miserable written address, which, of course, could not be changed the last moment, and might prove dangerous. It was necessary to prepare the road. Destree mounted the platform and in a masterly improvisation began by establishing a long, patient, skillful parallel between Flemish and Italian art, between the great painters of Florence and Venice and those of Flanders and Brabant; and from there he glided almost insensibly to the actual distress in Belgium today. He was applauded; the barriers were broken through. Nothing was to be added to what he had said, but he could have said anything to them then."

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING HELD

Quarters Will Have to Be Secured to Relieve Congestion Next Year.

At a meeting of the school board last evening it was decided to hold an election in June for the purpose of electing two new school directors. The terms of A. W. Lucas and Otto Holta will expire at that time.

Arrangements were made to advertise for bids for the repairing of the school buildings during the summer vacation. The buildings will be put in first-class shape and all needed repairs will be made during the summer.

A committee was appointed to take up the matter of finding a suitable room for class room purposes. The Patterson hall was suggested as a suitable place for this purpose and the matter will be taken up at once.

Bids were opened for furnishing a new boiler for the North Ward building. No contract was let and the matter was referred to the building and grounds committee.

P. H. Register was appointed census enumerator. The matter of discontinuing the kindergarten, to make room for more grades, was taken up and a suggestion to change the school year from nine to twelve months was discussed at length, the twelve-month term to include the opening of school at 7 o'clock and close at 1. Arrangements were also made for the commencement exercises.


