

FLOOD CONTROL BILL AMENDMENT ADOPTED

Washington, May 10.—The house committee of the whole today by a vote of 65 to 64 adopted Representative Lenroot's amendment to the flood control bill which provides that the appropriation for the Mississippi river shall not be expended for the construction or repair of any levee until the Mississippi river commission has assurances that local interests will contribute one-half of the sum allotted for the work.

CITY AUDITOR'S NOTICE—BIDS WANTED FOR PERFORMANCE OF CITY SCAVENGER WORK

Sealed bids will be received in the office of the Auditor of the City of Bismarck, N. D., up to 8 o'clock p. m. of Monday, May 22, 1916, from parties who desire to act as City Scavenger from time of awarding contract to December 1, 1916. Such offer must recite the sum for which said bidder will do the work, payment for which is to be collected from the party for whom such work is done. Offers in detail to be as follows:

For emptying and hauling garbage cans not larger than 24 inches in diameter and 30 inches in height, per can.....\$

For emptying and hauling garbage can larger than 24 inches in diameter or 30 inches in height, per can.....\$

For hauling garbage, ashes, manure or refuse, per load or part of load.....\$

For the removal of garbage, ashes, manure, etc., when extra or special trip is necessary or on special request, per load or part of load.....\$

Such garbage refuse, etc., is to be moved in tight wagon box, when taken in bulk, and must be transported to the city dumping grounds. Provided further that each and every citizen accumulating garbage, ashes or manure, etc., within the city limits, whether such accumulation is on the streets, alleys or private property, shall be visited by said scavenger at least once every two weeks, and said scavenger shall remove the garbage, etc., for such citizen at such times.

Said scavenger shall answer all special calls, but on such special request shall be entitled to extra remuneration, as called for in the bid.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of \$25.00 as an evidence of good faith, and the successful bidder will be required to enter into a contract with the city and to furnish a good and sufficient bond with two sureties, subject to the approval of the President of the Board of City Commissioners, in the sum of \$500.00, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties to December 1, 1916.

It is further provided that said scavenger must collect for all work performed from the party for whom it is done and that the City shall be liable in no way to said scavenger for any work performed and not paid for by such party.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all bids.


