

ANNOUNCE CHANGES IN A. C. STAFF

Board of Regents Elects New Instructors and Provides for Salary Increases.

Changes of importance in the teaching staff of the state Agricultural college, Fargo, were announced yesterday by the board of regents: Miss Katherine Jensen was elected as professor of home economics and will be the head of the department of home economics. Miss Jensen was an early graduate of the Agricultural college; has had considerable experience in public school work; took post-graduate work in domestic science at the University of Illinois; and for the past two years has been connected with extension work in home economics at the Montana Agricultural college. She comes especially well prepared to help strengthen the work at the college.

Augments Music Department.

Dr. C. S. Putnam was employed as director of band and orchestral music for the coming school year. The musical department will devote its attention largely to the development of a strong band and orchestra in connection with military work. Dr. Putnam formerly held this position at the Agricultural college.

Miss Hadley was promoted from the position of instructor to that of assistant professor of domestic science, and Miss Taylor from instructor to assistant professor in domestic art.

Dr. Schalk of the veterinary department was promoted to professor of comparative physiology in veterinary.

Many Salary Increases.

Twenty-one members of the faculty, together with a number of those connected with the experiment station, and extension work, received recognition for services rendered in a substantial way by an increase in salary.

MYSTERY IN BABY CORPSE

Unidentified Child's Body Found in Devils Lake, N. D., Cemetery.

Devils Lake, N. D., June 5.—No clue has yet been found to the identity of the body of an infant child, secretly buried in the local cemetery, the discovery of which started an investigation yesterday by local officials. That the body in a tobacco box for a casket was taken to the cemetery recently at night, and buried under a few inches of earth, either to hide shame or cover a crime is the conclusion reached. The body of the infant, which was almost entirely decomposed, was wrapped in a copy of the Devils Lake Journal of Nov. 15, 1915.

Buried by Coroner.

After a fruitless search for the parties responsible for taking it to the secret grave, or for bringing it into the world, Coroner E. W. Gilbertsch today ordered the body buried in the potters' field. Where the body was kept from November 15 until a few days ago is as much of a mystery as the other facts, which it appears will never be known. An investigation of the birth and death record for November fails to throw any light on the situation.

Schlichting Promoted.

The number of students completing the work at the Agricultural college for the year is 124; post-graduate, 1; Bachelor of Science, 52; Pharmacy, 7; high school, 27; Industrial courses, 27.

A. F. Schlichting was promoted to the position of professor of pharmacy, thus giving him charge of the work in the department of pharmacy. A new department for the coming year will be the introduction of the short or quiz course in pharmacy, especially designed to meet the wants of those who are preparing for positions as assistant pharmacists, under the North Dakota law. There have been a large number of applications and it is believed that this course will prove popular.

He has secured a large portion of the desired right of way and the station will be located as near the heart of the city as possible.

RAINS INCREASE BUTTER CROP

Flint Reports of Record Yield From State's Creameries.

North Dakota's butter run is exceeding all records. This is the belief of Robert F. Flint, state commissioner of agriculture and labor, and is based on reports that are coming in from the creameries of the state. "The butter yield per cow," declares Mr. Flint, "is probably not as large this year as at the same time in 1915, but North Dakota has more cows and this will make the total greater."

Helena, Mont., June 3.—Approximately 1,250,000 acres of land have been sold by the Northern Pacific in Montana during the fiscal year that ends next month, according to Thomas Cooper, land commissioner of the road, who, with President Hannafoord and General Passenger A. 
