ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT OF NORTH DAKOTA UNIVERSITY

Twenty-Seventh Commencement to Be Held the Week of the Eleventh.

Sunday will mark the opening of the commencement exercises of the University of North Dakota, when the Baccalaureate address will be given by President Frank L. McVey in the university gymnasium. Pastors of the various churches of Grand Forks will assist Dr. McVey and the music will be furnished by the combined glee clubs under the direction of Prof. W. W. Norton.

The program for the week follows: Monday class day exercises. At 9:45 a. m. the senior pilgrimage will begin when farewells will be said at Merrifield hall, Science hall, President's house on the campus and the university commons. At the latter place a tree will be planted.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the meetings of the state board of regents will be held at the president's office in Merrifield hall. At 10 o'clock a band concert will be given on the lawn north of Merrifield hall under the direction of E. H. Wilcox.

Class day exercises proper will be held at 2 o'clock on the Davis hall lawn.

At 4:30 the Phi Beta Kappa sorority will meet in the Women's League rooms of Davis hall, at which time candidates will be initiated.

The Shakespeare Tercentenary Masque will be given at 8:30 in Bankside theatre. The program will be in charge of the Sock and Buskin society and "Shakespeare, The Playmaker" will be presented in the form of a pageant-drama.

The Wesley college commencement will be held at 10 o'clock a. m. in Corwin hall. The Rev. Thomas W. Fessenden of Wesley church, Minneapolis, will deliver the address and President E. P. Robertson will present the diplomas.

Class reunion and luncheon will be held at 12 o'clock in the university commons. After the luncheon the meeting of the Alumni association will be held.

Memorial services for the late Prof. George St. John Purrott will be held in an auditorium of Woodworth hall at 2:30.

Inspection of buildings, libraries and laboratories will be held Tuesday afternoon from 4 o'clock to 6.

From 5:15 to 6 o'clock the president's reception will be held in the lobby of the university commons, when President and Mrs. McVey will receive members of the graduating class, Alumni and other friends of the university.

The commencement dinner will be held from 6 o'clock to 8 at the university commons. President McVey will be the toastmaster and short speeches will be made by Hon. Lewis F. Crawford, president of the state board of regents; Victor Wardrop, Miss Helen Sullivan, William A. Bacon, Lyle Bittinger. Rorke's five-piece orchestra will furnish the music.

The Shakespeare Tercentenary Masque will be repeated at 8:30 in Bankside theatre.

Commencement proper will be held Wednesday and the university procession will begin at 9:15 a. m. on the campus. The procession will be led by the band.

The twenty-seventh annual commencement will be held in the university gymnasium at 9:45 a. m. The commencement address will be delivered by Dr. Homer Baxter Sprague, president of the University of North Dakota from 1887-1891. At the conclusion of the address President McVey will confer the degrees. Rev. A. H. Thompson of the Methodist Episcopal church will conduct the devotional exercises and the music will be furnished by the university band and Herman F. Wolff, who will sing a solo.


