SEWING HINTS.
 For the Sewing Room—Select a small brass rod to allow spools of thread to slip on easily; fill the rod as full of spools as it will hold. Fasten to the wall with small brackets that come with the rod, and you will have a spool-holder that will be a joy forever.
 Cutting Out to Advantage—When cutting out garments, especially if there is doubt of there being sufficient material, it is an excellent plan to cut duplicates of the pattern pieces before beginning operations. These may then be laid on the material to the best possible advantage, so that when cut there is no possibility of having ruined the garment by failings

to cut one of the most important pieces.
Look out for the Selvedge—When having a natural color linen dress made be sure that the dressmaker removes the colored selvedge. Mine did not, and the first wetting of the dress (a sudden shower) resulted in green stains from the selvedge following every seam. These stains were most persistent and obstinate to remove, necessitating such strong solvents as to spot and dull the clear color of the dress, making it look old after only one laundering.
Two Tucking Hints—When making a tuck set your gauge the desired width of your tuck and stitch exactly as you would in seaming a straight seam.
 When making a tuck in an undershirt, always stitch it on the under or wrong side of your skirt. If this is done, however thin your dress skirt may be, no ridge can show through.
For Bloomers—If elastic is used in a casing in the top of children's bloomers, instead of the usual bands with buttonholes, they are easier and quicker made; and where the child is small it saves the mother much time in buttoning and unbuttoning the bloomers.
