

WILL FIGHT HORSE MANGE

Government Expert and Assistant State Veterinarian to Hebron.

The worst outbreak of mange for many years has been reported to the Livestock Sanitary board from Hebron. Dr. H. H. Colenour, government inspector, left yesterday for the field and will meet Dr. C. C. Jackson, assistant state veterinarian at Dickinson.

One man is said to have lost 100 head of horses. The disease appears to be in a very virulent form. All farms and ranches upon which the disease is found will be quarantined and the horses dipped in a crude oil solution. R. H. Treacy of Bismarck will have charge of the dipping.

WILLIAMS HELD ON SLAVERY CHARGE

Maurice C. Williams of St. Paul will face trial at this session of the federal court for violation of the Mann act. Late yesterday afternoon the federal grand jury returned an indictment against Williams, accusing him of transporting Stella Ebert from St. Paul to Minot.

Following the indictment a bench warrant was issued for the return of Williams to Fargo. He will be brought here tonight in the custody of United States Deputy Marshal Pat Bowler. Williams was arrested by federal officers last month. They also took into their custody Marguerite Kellar of St. Paul, as an accomplice. DRISCOLL ORGANIZES COMMERCIAL CLUB

Burleigh County Town Boosters Will Get-Together.

Driscoll organized a commercial club Wednesday night at a meeting at the school house. Thirty-five charter members were taken in. Temporary officers were elected as follows: E. A. Hull, president; J. L. Boucher, secretary; E. J. Anderson, treasurer; K. A. Erslund, H. A. Thomas, L. H. Langley, K. M. Nupen and M. O. Webber.

Two committees were organized: Committee on entertainment, K. O. Erslund and S. W. Morton; committee on organization, M. O. Webber, L. H. Langley and L. J. Anderson. The committee on organization will meet soon and prepare a constitution and by-laws.

Club leaders expect to have a membership of from 75 to 100 as soon as the organization has been perfected. Of the present membership 60 per cent are farmers, which shows the intense interest which is being taken by the rural population.

The first act of the club will be to purchase land for a park and an additional plot for dump grounds. "Driscoll has a population of 250," says Mr. Langley, "and is the liveliest town between Jamestown and Bismarck."
