

COMMENCEMENT AT THE NORMAL

Valley City School Will Graduate Large Class This Week

Valley City, N. D., June 16.—Dr. Theodore Kemp, President of Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington, Ill., will deliver the baccalaureate address opening the twenty-fourth annual commencement exercises at the state normal school here on Sunday evening.

The closing exercises and eighth grade commencement program of the training school will be held on Monday evening. There will be twenty-one candidates for the eighth grade diploma.

The twenty-first annual Junior play will be "The Rivals" by Richard Brinsley Sheridan, presented on Tuesday evening.

In physical education in competition for the Herrick trophy will take place on the campus Wednesday evening.

A program of folk dances and drills will be presented, and after which the faculty will appear in an entertainment for the benefit of the student loan fund.

Thursday is alumni day, opening in the morning with the class day exercises in the auditorium. The annual alumni-normal school baseball game will be played in the afternoon and will be followed by the annual business meeting of the association.

The reception and banquet to the class of 1916 will be held at the state dormitories at 6:00 p. m., and the promenade in the gymnasium at 9:20 p. m.

The twenty-fourth annual commencement program will be opened in the auditorium on Friday morning. Hon. L. F. Crawford of Sentinel Butte, President of the State Board of Regents, will deliver the principal address.

Black conferred with the state board of regents, at which meeting the matter of duplication in the meeting which affect the local school various schools was taken up. The positions of director of commercial department, assistant of mechanic arts and instrumental music, are not yet filled. Messrs. Dewey and McClurg and Miss Howell having other plans, and not being candidates for reelection. Miss Harris, student-teacher, will not return, having been engaged in the Dickinson city schools. These vacancies will be filled in a short time. MOVIES TO BE SHOWN AT NORMAL The Mayville Normal School has arranged with the Bureau of Commercial Economics of Washington, D. C. for a very fine series of moving picture programs to be given during the coming summer school which begins Wednesday, June 28. While these moving picture programs will

be interesting and entertaining they will be essentially instructive. They will deal chiefly with manufacturing, agriculture, and other industrial interests. Eight or ten of these moving picture programs will be given during the summer school and all will be free to students. The special lecturers for the summer school are Professor Garlond A. Bricker, an agricultural expert from the Ohio State University; Professor Maria L. Sanford, for many years a prominent member of the faculty of the Minnesota State University; President E. T. Mathes of the State Normal School at Ellingham, Wash., and Dr. J. Aroms Puffer, the well-known expert in boy problems. Professor Sanford is scheduled for lectures during a whole week, and Dr. Puffer for lectures during three days. The special lectures thus arranged for and which are entirely free to students will prove an exceedingly valuable part of the summer school program. Perhaps the diversion of most interest to the summer school students will be the Mayville Chautauqua, from July 9 to 13. Students will be admitted to the Chautauqua at a special low price and their recitation programs will be so arranged that they can take in the entire Chautauqua without missing any regular summer school work. Altogether, this year's summer school at the Mayville Normal school promises to be an exceptionally good one and the attendance will be large. WILLISTON MAN'S BROTHER KILLED Williston, N.
