Fraine stated last evening that he is well pleased at the manner in which everything has progressed to date. The doughty leader of the North Dakota regiment claims that he is in command of the finest aggregation of men it has ever been his pleasure to inspect and drill and he is proud of every khaki clad youth in the regiment. Fort Lincoln has been placed in excellent condition for the use of the troops who are encamped there and the boys will have every comfort that can be afforded them. Water facilities are of the best and other detail matters have been attended to since the latter part of the past week. Mowing machines have been busy cutting the long grass on the parade grounds and the men will be drilled regularly. Largest Company Encamped. Company D of Minot, Capt. F. E. Wheelan in command, is the largest company in the regiment. The company numbers 114 enlisted men and three officers. Capt. Wheelan is justly proud of "his boys" and in reporting to Col. Fraine last evening he said: "I have the largest company on the grounds and I will say for my boys that they are the finest bunch of

men I have ever had under my command. They can be depended on to do their duty at all times and the people of Minot and also the people of North Dakota will have a reason for being proud of them, if they are given an opportunity to display their valor on the field of battle." Impressive Scene. Hundreds of local and out-of-town sight-seers visited Ft. Lincoln yesterday to witness the soldiers pitching their tents and going through other maneuvers. The sight that greets a person when about a quarter of a mile from the fort is an impressive one and sends a thrill through the on-looker. As one rounds the bend and starts on the long stretch of road leading directly to Ft. Lincoln, they come upon a scene that will long live in their memory and sends a thrill to the heart of everyone. On the left may be seen the stately old buildings that have stood for years, and dotting the horizon o'er the entire camp can be distinguished Old Glory, the grand old flag, emblem of the United States since George Washington and his brave men fought for their independence. As one approaches the fort smaller flags may be seen on the right, where the officers and troops are encamped in their tents. Flags of different colors and descriptions greet the eye and designate the various companies of the First Regiment, North Dakota National Guard. The camp is laid out in such a manner so that even the uneducated in such life can easily find the company for whom they are looking. The field officers' tents are laid out in a straight line running north and south. The field officers' tents may be distinguished from those of the enlisted men and other officers with ease as they are termed the hospital wall tent and are shaped similar to the roof of an ordinary house. The enlisted men sleep in the well known pyramidal tent, which has a low wall of three or four feet and from the upper portion of the wall rounds off and comes to a point at the top. The enlisted men are camped along a line running from their commander's tent in an easterly direction. The mess tent comes first and from there on the regular pyramidal tents may be seen in a perfect line. Twelve men

can be accommodated with ease in each of these tents, but inasmuch as tents and other equipment is lacking at present sixteen men have been finding shelter under each one. He laid stress upon the value of winter, that the change of seasons was beneficial to mankind. Rev. Bruce E. Jackson, pastor of the First Baptist church, preached on false gods. He scored those who had set up as idols the gods of wealth, social position, fashion and pleasure. The last-named, he said, was one with which the soldiers now going to the front were most likely to be led astray. The hotels were crowded last night and large numbers were turned away owing to the many relatives and friends of militiamen in Bismarck.

IRELAND TALKS ON WAR. Fargo, N. D., June 24.—Archbishop John Ireland of St. Paul, delivering an address at a banquet tendered him here tonight, dealt with the Mexican crisis, briefly declaring that the prayers of all were directed in the hope that war could be avoided. Once, however, war is declared as the last recourse, Archbishop Ireland declared, it is every man's duty to push that work to a victorious and quick determination, to the end that the least possible human suffering shall be entailed.
