Governor Hanna journeyed to Ft. Lincoln yesterday afternoon and visited with many of his close friends who are now in service there. The governor consulted with the officers and after looking over the camp, equipment, etc., returned to the capital city.

**Men Enlisting Daily.**  
Major Henry reported last evening that men are enlisting daily in the various companies and the number of men now encamped at Ft. Lincoln greatly exceeds the number, 1,069, reported Monday evening. As all of the reports from the various captains had not been received he was unable to announce the official number of officers and men now enrolled.

**In an interview last evening Col. Fraine's adjutant stated that he is positive the rolls will show an enlistment of 1,200 men before the end of the week. Many new recruits are filing applications and the enthusiasm is growing stronger every hour.**

### TROOPS ORDERED TO ENTRAIN IMMEDIATELY

New York, June 27.—At the urgent request of General Funston, orders were issued late tonight by General Leonard Wood, commander of the department of the east, for the Pennsylvania and District of Columbia troops, to entrain for the border at the earliest possible moment.

The Pennsylvania troops were ordered to El Paso and to Bisbee, Ariz.

### OREGON REGIMENT TO WESTERN COAST

Calcakamas, Ore., June 27.—The Third battalion of the Third infantry, Oregon national guards, entrained and left Camp Wichemore for San Diego, Cal., late today. The Second battalion goes Wednesday.

### TROOPS WILL NOT HAVE TO CHANGE CARS

New York, June 27.—Owing to the large number of passenger cars required for the transportation of troops to the Mexican border, the Pennsylvania railroad announced here tonight that it would be forced within a few days to withdraw many cars in the regular service in order that troops moving from the various parts of the country may reach the border in as fresh condition as possible, and without delay, it will not be necessary for them to change cars. This will necessitate sending many cars of their own lines, in some cases many thousands of miles.

### TROOPS SPEED ON WAY TO BORDER

Harrisburg, Pa., June 27.—New York and New Jersey regiments, which passed through this city today, bound for the Mexican border, were speeded on their way by state and city officials, and given food by committees of women. Streets and bridges were lined with people who cheered the troops.

**Mexicans Taken Prisoners.**  
Between 30 and 40 Mexican prisoners were taken into the American camps at Colonia Dublan Monday afternoon in motor trucks, according to a rancher who arrived here late today, and who said the truck came from the direction of Carrizal. He believed a skirmish had taken place on the Santa Maria river, about 50 miles from Colonia Dublan.

### DIPLOMAT LEAVES FOR ALBUQUERQUE, N. M.

El Paso, Tex., June 27.—Dr. David Starr Jordan, delegated by the American Union Against Militarism to attempt to maintain peace between the United States and Mexico, left tonight for Albuquerque, N. M., to which place he announced the peace conference had been transferred. Before leaving he reiterated his statements that the organization was not against the principle of intervention, but expressed the hope that if intervention comes, it will not be through the motives for revenge of the death of the American citizens.

### NO DETAILS ON REPORTED CLASH

Mexico City, June 27.—There has been a clash between Mexicans and Americans in northern Sonora, according to a report from Brigadier General Calles, military governor of Sonora. No details were given.

### LOSS OF OFFICER REASON FOR DEFEAT

Majors Jenkins and Howze, returning today from their relief expedition toward Carrizal, gave it as their opinion that the negro troopers of the Tenth cavalry would have beaten the Mexicans had they not lost their officers. The death of Captain Adair and the wounding of Captain Morey took the heart out of the soldiers, they said.
