

### LIEUTENANT REFUSES TO ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY FOR RAID OVER BORDER

San Antonio, Texas, July 1.—Unwillingness of a lieutenant of the Eighth Cavalry today to assume responsibility when in pursuit of raiders near Ft. Hancock served to avert the adding of another perplexing situation to the international situation. Late reports to General Funston told of the raid by eight Mexicans about 54 miles southeast of El Paso. Lieutenant Edwin F. Hardy of the Eighth Cavalry, with a small detachment, began the pursuit. He did not come within range of the raiders, but followed them to a point where they ran into the river.

The lieutenant reported the incident, adding that he did not feel like assuming the responsibility of following the Mexicans across the Rio Grande. Captain Elroy was ordered by General Bell at Fabens to make an investigation, and if the trail was

found "hot" it was expected he would follow it across. He was instructed to avoid, if possible, a conflict with Carranza troops.

### ORDERS MEXICAN CONSUL TO ASSIST IN REMOVAL OF BODIES OF SOLDIERS KILLED

Andres Garcia, Mexican consul at El Paso, received authorization today from General Alvaro Obregon, Mexican minister of war, to assist the American military authorities in removing the bodies of the United States soldiers killed at Carrizal to the United States for burial.

### REPORTED MISSING. HE WAS ONLY OBEYING COMMANDER'S ORDERS

Douglas, Ariz., July 1.—Adam Dockery, a private in Co. B, Arizona organized militia, reported yesterday as missing, returned to camp today, after walking nearly 40 miles while on outpost duty. The private, a recent recruit, it was said at militia headquarters, was placed on duty at the international line yesterday with instructions to walk to the east until he met the sentry he was to relieve.

In some manner, Dockery missed the sentry, officers stated today. He kept walking until finally last night he met a patrol on guard at Slattery's ranch, eighteen miles east of the camp.

### OBREGON STRENGTHENS HIS BORDER ARMY

San Antonio, July 1.—While the war department today was moving to the frontier, thousands of the national guardsmen, General Obregon was engaged in strengthening his border army. Minor changes were directed by him in his army that now are quartered in force in almost all of the northern cities except a few that lie in view of American guns.

One of General Pershing's aviators reported that Mexican troops had been concentrated at Guesman, and that they had marched toward the American line, but his report showed the improbability of immediate trouble at that point.

### GETS \$850 IN SUIT OVER POOR SEED

Fargo, N. D., July 1.—The verdict in the last jury case of this term of court was rendered yesterday morning.

The case was that of the State bank of Georgetown against E. Aggerhalm and others. The verdict was for the defendant in the amount of \$850.

Of this amount, \$150 is for damage of foul seed, and \$700 for damage to the crop. There are several issues in

### MOBILIZATION AT BORDER TO BE COMPLETED SOON

El Paso, Texas, July 1.—Mobilization of a large part of the National Guard organizations ordered to El Paso was expected tonight to be completed before daylight. Several trains carrying the Massachusetts militia-men arrived today.

At military headquarters no information concerning the arrival of the state soldiers was available. Coincident with the arrival of the first guard organizations, the Massachusetts ambulance and hospital corps, what appeared to be a redistribution of the troops in this border patrol district was begun.

Two troops of the Eighth Cavalry were dispatched from Ft. Bliss to Ft. Hancock, Texas, 53 miles east of El Paso, presumably to reinforce the garrison there. It was reported, however, that they also are to hunt Mexican rustlers, said to have crossed the border to a Texas ranch last night and to have stolen a few head of stock.

By the end of the week those in charge of the guard mobilization believe it will be completed. Without having interfered with the regular traffic, the American Railway association were moving the trains to their destination.

The First Illinois was the first regiment to go into camp here, and it was

Duluth, Minn., July 1.—Tomorrow many Duluthians will not be able to call their autos their own, because it is "Jit" day and many are giving their cars away for the day. Those who aren't loaning their cars are expected to ride in other people's cars in case they see their hard earned and well run machine dash by filled with a throng of absolute strangers.

The families of the national guard are to benefit by this innovation and cars will be run in all directions (at different times—that is) for a certain consideration, although the usual fare of 10 cents will hold good on all downtown routes. Many fair lady "jitters" may take the matter of steering Duluth's citizens about into their own hands, but even this is not going to cost any more, and Red Cross boxes are to be put in all the machines, in the regular jitneys, too, to receive fares or anything people may want to drop in. It is expected that a hearty response will follow this effort to realize a good sum to turn over to the families of those who are at Fort Snelling, "doing time."
