

NOTIFY FIRST TO BE READY FOR ACTION

C. O. Ulness Says Boys Were Informed That They Might Expect Raid.

The North Dakota regiment may see action at any time, according to a letter received yesterday by Mrs. C. O. Ulness from her husband who is with Co. A.

The letter follows:
In Camp, Mercedes, Texas, Sunday. We have been very busy getting camp in shape. Just now came in from driving a set of tent stakes. There is a rumor around camp that we are going to San Diego, but hope it is not true as we are just beginning to get a good camp. Yesterday we were told that General Pershing had notified the officers that a raid was expected in this vicinity at any time soon and that regiments stationed here would have to go to the border. It has rained every day since we came here. Yesterday we went out and took a bath in the rain. Today the bathhouses are finished and we had a good bath. It took the Mexicans several days to get started building the bath house, and they wouldn't have finished now if we hadn't sent some soldiers down to help them.

Camp On Canal.

Our camp is located on the outskirts of the town, on the banks of a large irrigation canal. There are guardsmen and regulars located all around us. Closest to us is a regiment of Texas cavalry. The Minnesota boys are located about three miles out. The New York regiments are also some three or four miles out. There are several millionaire's sons in the New York bunch.

On Helen Gould Cots.

We are now sleeping on Helen Gould cots with mosquito nets made to fit the cots so we are quite comfortable and protected. There is however, a tiny red mite which comes into the bunks and is very annoying.


The elevation here is 61 feet above the Gulf of Mexico. Mercedes is 14 miles west of Harlingen, which is 23 miles from the gulf. On our way from Kingsville to Harlingen there were times when we were only five or six miles from the gulf and I imagined I could smell the ocean in every breeze.

The Count and Billy are both in the best of spirits and health. Except for my shoulders, which are badly sunburned, I am feeling fine and eating more than I have for years.

We now have our camp site cleared of grass and brush and things are rapidly becoming safer and freer of insects.

HAIL STORMS IN LOOP DISTRICT
