FINISHES SURVEY OF DEVILS LAKE

**Prof. Chandler Has Discovered
Some Interesting Phenomena.**

Leeds, N. D., Aug. 26.—Prof. E. F. Chandler head of the Department of Civil engineering at the State University of North Dakota (at Grand Forks, returned from the region of Devils Lake, where he has completed a survey in the interest of the biological department of the University.

Prof. Chandler has discovered some interesting phenomena in regard to the lake region during his examination. Perhaps most startling one made is that the eastern bay of the Lake, which some years ago was cut off from the main body of water is at present one foot and ten inches below the main body of the Lake. The reason for this difference is believed to be due to the fact that the small lake is fed by less springs and tributaries than in the main lake.

The discovery of Prof. Chandler comes as a great surprise to a large number of inhabitants of the region and others interested in the topography of the country as it was not generally believed that the difference in the levels of the two bodies was so great. In fact, until very recently it was believed by some people that the east lake was higher than the big lake, and the idea of digging a canal through the east section was advised so that the main lake may be filled.

Prof. Chandler in measuring the present levels of the lake, finds that the water has dropped 15 feet since 1885, although at present the lake is more than a foot higher than it was a year ago, on account of the heavy rains of the spring. The period from 1883 to 1900 was one which the lake went to the greatest amount, more than nine feet of water disappeared during the seven years. From 1900 the water remained at standstill for a number of years and then began to decrease gradually again as the dry years followed on another. Last spring being an exceptionally wet season the lake realized much benefit from the surplus moisture.

REPORT ON THE POTATO PROSPECTS

Moorhead, Minn., Aug. 25.—County Agent P. E. Clement, accompanied by Messrs. Stakman, Bisby, Tolaas and Piemesel, plant specialists of the Minnesota Agricultural college, after a tour of Clay county, checking up experimental plots and studying the potato situation, stated today that there was very little of the so-called blackleg and fusarium, but that the dreaded rhizoctonia was playing havoc with tubers on heavy soil in this district.

This disease is known by a number of names, the most common being rhizoctonia. Various symptoms are evident, and very frequently the stems rot near the surface of the ground, while discoloration may also

appear. Young plants may be killed prematurely, only small tubers being developed.

In other cases the vines are large and bushy, but only small potatoes are produced, while the leaves often curl and the tops present a compact rosette appearance. A characteristic symptom is aformation of small potatoes just above the ground.

In Clay county, which is one of the

banner potato producing regions of the northwest, the potato crop will be far from normal this year. On heavy soil, the crop is poor, while much of the crop was washed out. The best prospects were found around Hawley and around Barnesville.
