





F-M'S AGAIN COP THE CHAMP TITLE

Repeat Their Win of Northern League Pennant in Close Race

Fargo, N. D., Sept. 4.—Fargo-Moorhead won the pennant in the Northern league for the second time, today, by defeating Duluth both games of a double bill, winning, 4 to 1, in the first game and 4 to 2 in the second.

Winnipeg defeated Superior, 13 to 2 and 11 to 4, in their double-header, played today.

Fargo-Moorhead's pennant drive during the past few weeks has been most remarkable. The team assumed the lead several weeks ago, and has never been headed off. During the forward march of the local crew, it has lost only eight games out of a total of 33, five of these being lost to the Winnipeg club.

When Unglaub drives his men under the wire today for their second pennant, he achieves a most remarkable triumph. Throughout the early part of the season, the Fargo-Moorhead club was in a bad way. Before the split season was determined on, Fargo-Moorhead was in fifth position, but it is interesting to note that the club's present standing places it within a game or two of the absolute championship for the entire season.

Unglaub's fine pitching staff has made the result possible. Rook, Bell, Eardman and Wright have made a dependable quartet during the past few weeks, and they have turned in one victory after the other.

Tonight, Fargo and Moorhead fans will attend a banquet to the baseballers, in appreciation of the club's remarkable showing.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 4.—Michael McDermott, of the Illinois Athletic club, Chicago, won the National Marathon championship in the annual Labor Day games at the Missouri Athletic association here this afternoon. He made the ten miles in one hour, forty-five minutes, forty-three and two-fifths seconds.

SAXON COMPANY WILL GIVE EMPLOYEES BONUS

Each office employee, who has been with the Saxon Motor Car Corporation for a period of longer than ninety days, will receive a bonus of 5 per cent of the salary received during the year or for the term of employment if less than one year but more than ninety days.

Each factory employee will share on a like basis with those in the office departments except those who have been paid on a premium of piecework basis and who will receive a bonus of 3 per cent.

The payment of these bonuses will be made on September 4, 1916.

President Harry W. Ford, in commenting on this act of the company, said: "The payment of a bonus at this time does not bind the company to a policy of bonuses each year; however, the management feels that in years when the prosperity of the company is such as to enable it to make a return to the shareholders, it will also be disposed to pay some form of bonus to employees. It is hoped that the payment of this bonus will encourage each employee to study his work to the end that each one may increase his efficiency.

"For the payment of this first bonus it seemed wise to us to use a flat percentage to all employees with the exception above noted.

"In the future, however, a record of each individual employee will be taken into consideration. Punctuality, carefulness, obedience to all company rules and regulations, loyalty, willingness to co-operate with the desires of the management at all times and in every way, will be taken into consideration in payment of any bonus that may be decided upon in the future, and each employee will share in such fund in proportion to the quantity and quality of the service he renders.

"The real object of this institution is to sell Saxon cars at a profit, and the ability of this company to maintain itself in a prosperous condition depends in the long run upon the goodness, serviceability and reliability of the cars we build.
