GRAND OPERA STARS TO APPEAR IN CAPITAL CITY

Brilliant Musical Season Planned for 1916-1917 Under Management of Mrs. Cushing.
 From Mrs. W. F. Cushing comes the interesting announcement that Bismarck, Mandan and sister cities are to be given the opportunity of a brilliant musical season. She will bring to the city four of the finest attractions possible to obtain. They will include the San Carlo Grand Opera company, Mme. Johanna Gadski, John McCormack and the New York Symphony orchestra with Walter Damrosch as conductor, making the season of 1916-1917 a noteworthy one.

Devotees of music-drama will feel a keen interest in this announcement. The San Carlo Opera company was made famous a few years back by such artists as Mordica, Nielsen, Constantino, Campanari and others. This organization is now recognized in the grand opera world to be the only one that has, for the past several seasons, survived the uncertain times in the American musical field, it now being an accepted fact that all other big companies, including the Chicago and New York organizations, have ended their seasons with heavy financial deficits. Upwards of one hundred people comprise the San Carlos forces and the performances are directed by two celebrated maestros and the repertoire embraces French, German and Italian masterworks.

Three performances will be given, opening with probably Carmen (Bizet) Friday evening, December 15. Puccini's Madam Butterfly has been chosen for the matinee of Saturday, the 16th, while the double bill of I Pagliacci (Leoncavallo) and Cavalleria Rusticana (Mascagni) will mark the closing event of Saturday evening. A richer combination of operas, it is believed, could scarcely be chosen.

Contracts have also been closed for a concert appearance of John McCormack in this city on the evening of March 5, and two days later he will

appear in Fargo, under Mrs. Cushing's direction. With a concert by Mme. Johanna Gadski early in January and a re-appearance of the New York Symphony orchestra, an event of the spring, musical taste of western North Dakota could receive no more gratifying advices.
