WHEAT SALES ARE IMPEDED

STOCK MARKET AGAIN ACTIVE

Uneasiness in Regard British Trade Restrictions Given As Reasons

Chicago, Sept. 16.—Uneasiness in regard to British trade restrictions did a good deal today to impede the selling of wheat. Largely in consequence, the market closed unsettled, 1 3/4 to 2 5/8 cents lower, with December at \$1.47 1/8 to \$1.47 3/8, and May at \$1.48 to \$1.48 1/4. Corn lost 3/8 to 5/8 cents.
Oats lost 1/8 to 3/8 cents. Provisions finished irregular, ranging from 47 cents decline to a rise of 15 cents. Conflicting opinions were put forth as to whether or not the latest London trade regulations concerning neutrals had reference to wheat. The uncertainty counted decidedly in favor of the bears, especially as foreign markets had failed to respond to yesterday's up turn in prices here.
Continuance of the miller's strike in Great Britain tended also to handicap the bulls.
Corn weakened with wheat, besides, it was said a frost prediction had not been fulfilled to the extent that had been looked for and that in any case not more than 15 per cent could be hurt.

Closing Day of Remarkable Week Shows Ferment of Speculation

New York, Sept. 16.—The week in the stock market terminated in much the same way that it opened, a ferment of speculation sales in the two-hour session amounting to nearly 800,000 shares, equivalent to a full day of 2,000,000.
There was a marked change in the character of the operations, however, interests converging almost entirely about the railway division, in which extreme gains of one to almost three points were fairly numerous.
Except for U. S. Steel, which continued its upward career to the new record of 108, Industrials, Equipment and Munitions were in comparatively light demand, although Drigs-Seabury gained an additional seven points.
A distinctly irregular undertow was denoted by the favorites at the early upward movement in most issues was being used as a probe to unload the mercantile stock.
United States coupon 4's were three-fourths per cent lower on call during the week.
