# THE MARKETS

## WHEAT GOES UP FROM WAR RUMOR

## STOCK MARKET IS UNSETTLED

Market Closes Steady, 1-8 to 1-4 Cents Up; Corn Takes Dip Downward.

Despite Reverses Operations Again Run Well Beyond Million Mark.

Chicago, Sept. 20.—Reports that armies of Roumania were in a perilous position tended today to lift the price of wheat but word of a Roumanian victory near the Black sea acted later as an offset.  
The market closed steady, with December at \$1.49 and May at \$1.50 and with the market as a whole one-eighth cents to one-fourth cents up as compared with yesterday's finish. Corn closed unchanged to one-half at one-fifth cents lower. Oats at an advance of one-eighth cents to five-eighths cents. Provision were unchanged, 15 cents higher.  
Bulls seemed to be indisposed for a while to put any stress on admissions from London that Roumanians had been caught at a disadvantage by Bulgarian attacks in the southeast. Disappointment over the comparative smallness of export business counted late in the day as a handicap on the wheat bulls. The total was only 400,000 bushel.

New York, Sept. 20.—Diminution of public interest, coupled with persistent bearish encroachment, brought about some unsettlement in today's stock market. Operations again ran well beyond a million shares for the twelfth consecutive full session, but this activity was maintained largely at the expense of quoted values.  
Recessions were not especially severe, except in some of the highly speculative issues, whose technical position made them vulnerable to attack. As a matter of fact, certain issues, notably the leading Coppers, were consistently strong. Anaconda rising three and five-eighths points to the new record of 94 1/2 cents, while Utah, allowing for its recent dividend aggregating three points, also made a new maximum of \$7 1/8 cents.  
Pressure was directed against the Rails soon after the strong opening, later extending to U. S. Steel, which fluctuated between \$1.98 3/4 to \$1.07, closing at \$1.07 7/8, a net loss of one-fourth point.  
The day's news had little or no bearing upon market conditions, but recent sessions were indicative of the growth and increasing confidence of the short interests. Rumors that the financial institutions were exercising closer scrutiny of collaterals offering for loans, were helpful to the movement. Total sales amounted to 1,150,000 shares.

PERCY MACKAYE WRITES HE NEVER SAW "AUTHORS' LETTER" WITH HIS NAME APPENDED.

Percy Mackaye, playwright, whose name appeared as one of the signers of the so-called "authors' letter," published in the newspapers last week, knew nothing about the matter until after publication, according to a statement given out yesterday at Republican national headquarters. The letter attacked Charles E. Hughes' criticism of President Wilson as "non-constructive" and propounded ten questions for Mr. Hughes to answer. In a letter to Mr. Hughes Mr. Mackaye said:

"My attention has just been called to an open letter addressed to you, printed in the New York Herald of August 2, signed by a number of professional writers, among whom my name is included. I beg to send you this word, to say that I did not sign the letter and never saw or heard of the letter until it was shown to me in print."

It was stated at Republican headquarters that neither Mr. Hughes nor any of his staff had seen the letter except as it appeared in the newspapers.
