

FLAX STRAW

\$20 A TON

Advantages of Tow Mill in This District Would Be Beneficial to Many.

Twenty dollars per ton for flax straw which has been sent once through the brake rolls is the Commercial club's latest quotation on tow. This price is offered for o. b. cars St. Paul, and would be equivalent to \$17 for the tow, or \$8.50 for each ton of straw, manufactured into tow at this point. The loss in transforming flax straw into tow ranges from forty to sixty per cent, according to the percentage of weeds. Two tons of straw, if relatively free from thistle and other weeds, will produce one ton of tow.

If a small tow mill were established here, it should be possible to have a milling in transit rate established which would give Bismarck the advantage of the through rates from all local points to St. Paul. A Minnesota concern which manufactures tow mills quotes flax straw 36-roll brakes at \$1,800; 48-roll brakes at \$2,150; self-feeders at \$350; shakers at \$225 and the hay press required for baling at \$225. The mechanical equipment for a small tow mill could,

therefore, be acquired for a trifle less than \$3,000, which would represent a very conservative estimate of the profit on 1,000 tons of straw.

There seems to be a very healthy demand for flax tow, and according to advice received from Washington this demand is not due to the European war, particularly, but to the general increase in consumption of the fibre.

SON SHOTS FATHER. GIVES HIMSELF UP

Sheldon, N. D., Sept. 21.—William Eauch, the well known Forman veterinarian, was shot and instantly killed by his son, Ray, about 8:30 Saturday evening, at his home. The young man surrendered himself to the sheriff and was lodged in the county jail awaiting a preliminary hearing.

At the coroner's inquest, the young man told his story. He claimed the shooting was in self-defense. The father came to the Van Ornum home, where Mrs. Bauch and her son were stopping, about 8 o'clock in the evening. He had been drinking heavily and made threats to kill his wife. When he drew a pistol from his pocket the young man grappled with his father and succeeded in getting possession of the gun. He shot his father through the body and he died in a few minutes, without gaining consciousness.


