

### NEW INSTRUCTORS FOR STATE NORMAL

Resignations and Increased Registrations Bring New Faces to Valley City School.

Valley City, N. D., Sept. 22.—Crowded departments and resignations will bring several new instructors and assistants to the faculty of the State Normal school here, when the fall term opens next Tuesday morning. In the department of music, Mrs. Aslaug Olson Wright will succeed Miss Katherine Fjelde as piano instructor. Mrs. Wright is a graduate with first honors of Glenn Dillard Gunn and Arthur Oalf Anderson. She was connected for a number of years with Fargo conservatories, where she became one of the earliest exponents of normal class work, a movement comparable with the recently introduced "After school violin classes" and one that is said will likely revise piano teaching standards.

Prof. Hugh Cowan Souder, of Milbank, S. D., has been engaged as assistant in the department of education. Mr. Souder is a graduate of Maryville college, Maryville, Tenn., and took the degree of master of arts from the University of South Dakota, Vermillion. He had an extensive teaching experience in Indiana schools before coming to South Dakota, where he taught at Watertown and later became superintendent at Big Stone City. At the present time he is resigning from the superintendency of the Grant county, S. D., schools.

Prof. J. H. Seymour, for the past two years assistant in the department of agriculture, has been promoted to succeed Prof. M. C. James, who has resigned to become better farming agent for Barnes county. Prof. Seymour will be assisted by Prof. P. W. Fattig, who comes from the high school faculty at Springfield, O. Prof. Fattig holds the degree of master of science from Ohio State university, and has furthered his studies at Cornell and Michigan universities. He has been teacher, principal and superintendent in Ohio city schools and for some time taught at Trinity university, Wapakoneta, Ohio.

Miss Harriet B. Gardner, of Lansing, Mich., will come as assistant in the department of home economics to succeed Miss Florence Tilson, who has become director of domestic science at Buhl, Idaho. Miss Gardner is a graduate of the Michigan State Agricultural college with the degree of bachelor of science and took her master's degree from the Oregon State Agricultural college. For the past two years she has been director of home economics at Lincoln college, Lincoln, Ill., which position she is leaving to come to the Normal school.

In the department of languages, Miss Florence H. Carroll, of Chicago, succeeds Miss Helen M. Rand, who has accepted a scholarship at Radcliffe college for the coming year. Miss Carroll recently received the degree of bachelor of philosophy at Chicago university, where she was also elected to the honorary scholastic fraternity, Phi Beta Kappa. She has had an extensive experience as tutor and instructor of foreign languages. Miss Lota King, also a graduate of Chicago university with several years of teaching experience will assist in the department of rural school studies, where Prof. B. A. Wallace is granted a year's leave of absence to further his studies at the University of Minnesota, where he will also instruct.

Miss Edna Hackett has become assistant critic in the Training school, succeeding Miss Carrie Dean, resigned. Miss Hackett is a graduate of Mt. Pleasant, Mich., state normal school and for a number of years taught in the Valley City schools, then in the states of Washington and Idaho. Later she returned to the State Normal school at Valley City and completed the advanced course in 1915. Last year she was assistant librarian at the school.

Miss Florence Beachem, of Valley City, will also become assistant instructor in piano in the department of music. Miss Hamilton, recently completed the course in piano here and played here graduate recital during the last summer school. Miss Hamilton has spent a year in Berlin in study with Rudolph Ganz, returning on account of the outbreak of the war to continue her studies with Prof. George W. Weller, of Fargo, a former pupil of Ganz. She completed her work with Miss Katherine Fjelde here.

Miss Ina Jefferson, a graduate of the normal school with the class of 1915, and who last year taught in the Dickey N. D., schools, will return to come assistant in the normal school museum. Miss Jefferson succeeds Miss Cora Rovers, resigned.

Miss Amanda Erlanson, of Sutton, a former student in the commercial department, has become assistant in the general office of the state normal school.

### BIG PREMIUM LIST FOR GOOD SEED SHOW

Bolley Asks That All Growers Send Exhibits to Devils Lake Exhibition

Prof. H. L. Bolley, secretary and treasurer of the North Dakota Improved Seed Growers association, has issued a call for exhibits at the annual show of the organization, which will be held at Devils Lake, November 14, 15 and 16.

The call follows: "As secretary of the North Dakota Improved Seed Growers association, I wish to call to the attention of the farmers and citizens of the state that the annual seed growers' contest occurs this year at Devils Lake, on dates of November 14, 15 and 16, meeting with the Grimm Alfalfa Growers' association and the Lake Region annual fair.

"Mrs. Clark W. Kelley, local director of the Devils Lake branch association, has authorization from the state association to receive all exhibits for the contest, and will superintend the taking of the samples to be analyzed and tested at the pure seed laboratory. All exhibits for the annual seed contest should be mailed or expressed to Mrs. Kelley, so as to reach Devils Lake by October 28. If you wish to have the samples entered for the major prizes of the seed association.

"All samples will be properly saved and placed on exhibition by the local committee at Devils Lake. It is essential that the exhibits be sent in at the early date named in order that the samples for analysis and purity tests may be made before the contest ever held. The year gives promise of an opportunity for the association to do great good in bringing together, buyers and users of seed together so that the best possible seed may be used on the land. Seed of high quality is scarce. Do not hesitate to exhibit what you have for sale.

"The big premium list is now in press and shows over \$1,000 in cash prizes. The list will be sent to all parties who wish to aid in the distribution. Anyone wishing copies should send in their name and address at once to either Mrs. Clark Kelley at Devils Lake, or H. L. Bolley, Agricultural College, N. D."

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### PRESIDENT ANNOUNCES BIG GIFT TO COLLEGE FUND

Just before the opening of Jamestown College, September 19th, President Kroeze made a hurried trip to the east and brought back with him news of an additional gift of \$20,000 to the endowment and something over \$2,000 for special funds, including a good sized item for the students' loan fund. This was the occasion of special rejoicing at the opening of the year. The end of the campaign for the \$300,000 is now apparently near.

### PETTIGREW MAKES 'JOKER' CHARGE

Says Proposed Dakota Prohibition Amendment Wouldn't Prohibit

Sioux Falls, S. D., Sept. 22.—R. F. Pettigrew, former United States senator, is out with the statement that there is a joker in the proposed prohibition amendment to the state constitution. He charges it is a "drug store amendment," instigated by wholesale drug houses or patent medicine interests, or both.

The amendment is to be voted on in November. Mr. Pettigrew claims that through a defect in the wording of the form of submission, even if licensed saloons are wiped out in South Dakota, there would be no way to prevent the sale of liquor in drug stores, and every saloon would become a drug store and every drug store a saloon.

His communication, which will be widely quoted during the coming weeks by the voters of South Dakota, is as follows: "I see that a constitutional amendment has been proposed by the last legislature which proposes to insert into the constitution a provision: '1. That no person shall, after the 1st day of July, 1917, manufacture for beverage purposes any intoxicating liquors, except as hereinbefore provided; and further, that no person shall import from any other state or country any intoxicating liquors or any mixture or compound which in part consists of intoxicating liquors, except as hereinafter provided, and then this amendment provides as follows: 'Provided, that nothing in this article contained shall be construed to prohibit the compounding, importation, sale or keeping for sale any spirituous or vinous liquors or compounds or mixtures which consist in part of spirituous or vinous liquors in this state for medicinal, mechanical, sacramental or scientific purposes by regularly registered pharmacists, under such regulations and restrictions as the legislature may prescribe.' Says It Will Nullify.

"This proviso, if adopted, will nullify the entire amendment and make every drug store in the state a saloon and every saloon in the state a drug store. Under this proviso every saloon can secure the services of a registered pharmacist, fill the shelves with patent medicines and liquors, and the legislature will be powerless to stop them or pass any legislation to prohibit the unlimited sale of liquor in this state.

Would Be Powerless. "If this constitutional amendment is defeated, I think perhaps the legislature can pass such laws as are necessary to prevent and prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; but if it is adopted, the legislature is powerless to restrict or restrain the unlimited sale of intoxicants in South Dakota.

"This is a drug store amendment and must have been instigated by the wholesale drug houses or the patent

### PER CAPITAL WEALTH OF VALLEY CITY IS \$330

Valley City, N. With a population estimated at over 6,000, the per capita wealth in Valley City is approximately \$330.

### GREAT NORTHERN DELAYS BUILDING OF EXTENSION

New Rockford, N. D., Sept. 22.—That the Great Northern will not build its Lewiston extension within the coming year, is now generally understood. As a result of the Great Northern's failure to bridge the Missouri river,

which is a part of the work essential to the projected line, the Soo railroad also has given up bridging that stream at present.

It is understood an attempt is being made to reach an agreement whereby the same bridge will serve for both lines, their surveys being close together.
