Officers of First May Establish Tent City Near Regimental Camp

## DEPENDS ON HOW

### LONG TROOPS WILL STAY

By BEN L. BROOKS. Mercedes, Texas, Sept. 28.—Now that the excitement attendant upon pay day at the North Dakota camp has subsided, life for the boys has resumed its normal military condition. There are the daily drills, of course, and the regimental and battalion problems which now take the place of the 12-mile hikes which were at first on the daily schedule. One of the hardest of the battalion "problems" to solve, apparently, is the problem of securing a tract of uncultivated land large enough for the maneuvers. Yesterday a battalion advanced upon the "enemy" through a cotton field and the fact that the field was a mass of morning glories and weeds and that there was no cotton to be seen on the stalks, the owner having harvested most of the crop, did not deter the said owner from putting in a bill for several acres of damaged cotton. But that is the customary spirit displayed here and nobody is interested in saving Uncle Sam any money. The idea is that the guardsmen are one of the best crops the lower Rio Grande has ever had, and the residents believe in making hay while the sun shines. A hundred farmers around Mercedes have quit the slow method of acquiring wealth through tilling the soil and have purchased automobiles or Fords—mostly Fords—to transport the soldiers wherever they want to go. The Dakota boys, however, are fortunate that they are camped right on the edge of town, and unlike the Nebraska, Indiana and Minnesota troops at the big Llano Grande camp, they do not have to pay

May Bring Families. The separation of the Dakota troops from the others mentioned also has other advantages, particularly in a social way. A number of officers are contemplating bringing their families here, providing it can be ascertained how long the Dakota regiment will remain on the border, and as there is not a house in town to be rented for any price, it is probable that a tent colony for the families of the officers will be established. The winters here are so mild, the thermometer seldom registering freezing

weather, a tent properly erected is as comfortable as a house could be in Bismarck.

The malaria in camp is continually decreasing, owing to the strict mosquito bar inspection and the additional precaution of a shot of quinine administered to each man daily, and another week or two of the North Dakota July weather now being enjoyed here will completely eliminate the stagnant water surrounding the North Dakota camp.

Expect Patrol Duty. Speculation about going home has been replaced with figuring out just how soon the North Dakota regiment will be given actual patrol duty along the Rio Grande, some six miles from camp. Patrols are maintained along the river to prevent the landing of cattle runners and smuggling, and at the point directly south of the camp several bands of bandits crossed over a year ago during the bandit trouble here. The Minnesota, Nebraska and Indiana regiments are now taking their turn at guarding Uncle Sam's boundary line and North Dakota's turn will come next. The boys are all anxious for the patrol duty, as it is found to be more exciting than camp life.

# MOVES TO OUST COUNTY BOARD

Proceedings Started Before Referee Against the Hettinger Commissioners

## SCORES ARRIVE TO ATTEND HEARING

Mott, N. D., Sept. 28.—That defeat faces Attorney V. H. Crane in his race for states attorney is the claim of defendants in a hearing started before Benton Baker, referee in an ouster proceedings brought against Wm. Colgrove, Paul Smith and John Reiger, members of the board of Hettinger County commissioners.

Robert E. Beery, formerly a county auditor of Hettinger county, and now one of the deputy state examiners is alleged to have secured a considerable amount of information upon which action has been based. Attorney Crane charges the commissioners with sixteen specific instances of irregularities, frauds and corruptions.

When Beery concluded his investigation, Attorney Crane appealed to the attorney general's office, but was advised to go to Governor Hanna who appointed I. P. Baker of Bismarck as referee and the latter opened the hearing and taking of testimony here this morning.

Archives Jacobson and Murray of Mott and Attorney L. A. Simpson of Dickinson are appearing for the defense and Attorney Crane in his own behalf. The defendants have entered a sweeping denial of all the charges of irregularities and assert that whatever action they have taken has been for the best interests of Hettinger county.

Wm. Colgrove, who is chairman of the board, has been a resident of Hettinger county for forty years, and having served four years on the board of commissioners has been renominated for another four years. Paul Smith has served for four years and holds for two more and John Reiger also has two more years to serve.
